Funeral of Mrs. Southam.\_\_The funeral of Mrs. E. C. Southam was held at St. Thomas church Monday morning and was largely attended. The services were conducted by the rector, Rev. J. E. Ramsdell. \_\_Mrs. Isabel Gould Southam was born on White Cross Street, London, Oct. 25, 1847. Her father's family, consisting of parents, one sister and five brothers, came to America when she was four years old, and one year later they settled in Olmstead, O. She was married to Edwin C. Southam, Sept. 25, 1867, and for more than 30 years they have resided on the same farm, one mile west of Berea. Five sons and five daughters have been born to them, all of whom survive their mother, except one daughter, Ellea, who died at the age of ten years. She was held in the highest esteem by her neighbors and friends and was identified with the local W.C.T.U.,

the members of which society attended the funeral in a body. \_\_The deceased was also a member of St. Thomas Episcopal Church, and a regular attendant upon its services. She was devoted to her family and to the church. The rector, in his discourse, truly remarked of her, that during her active Christian life, she exemplified the words of Tennyson: \_\_"Life is real, life is earnest! \_And the grave is not its goal; \_Dust thou art, to dust returneth, \_Was not spoken of the soul." \_The music of the occasion was furnished by a selected choir. The remains were taken to Woodvale vault, followed by a long line of carriages. Father of Captain Southam Dies\_Edwin C. Southam, 88, father of Captain Corbett E. Southam of the Elyria police department, and grandfather of Mrs. Charles Snoble, also of this city, passed away yesterday at his home, 298 South Rocky River, Berea. Mr. Southam was born in Strongsville, in 1846, moving to Berea 65 years ago where he had resided since. He was a contractor and carpenter by trade. It was while working last fall shingling a house that he became ill, and has been in ill health ever since. Mr. Southam was a charter member of the Cuyahoga County Agricultural Society, operators of the Berea Fair. He was the father of John R. Southam, former mayor of Berea, who preceded him in death several years ago. The son was a recipient of the Congressional Medal of Honor awarded for extra-ordinary valor under fire in France during the World War. \_\_Six children, eighteen grandchildren and eight greatgrandchildren survive. The sons, in addition to Corbett, are William of Berea, and Fred of Memphis, Tenn. The daughters are Mrs. Edith Dunlea, Berea; Mrs. Blanche Wedell, Strongsville; and Mrs. Edna Riel, Fremont.\_\_Funeral services will be held on Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Emil C. Haag Funeral Home, 50 East Bridge Street, Berea. E. C. Southam Succumbs Here. \_\_Was Father of Late Mayor John R. Southam; Rites Yesterday.\_\_Edwin C. Southam, 89, father of the late John R. Southam, world war hero and former mayor of Berea, died Monday in his home, 298 South Rocky River Drive, Berea.\_\_Mr. Southam had been a resident of Berea for sixty-five years. Born in Strongsville in 1816, he moved to Berea in 1869 and has lived here ever since. He was a contractor and carpenter and did his last work last fall when he built two houses in Strongsville. While shingling one of them he became ill, and has been ill ever since.\_\_He was a charter member of the Cuyahoga County Agricultural Society.\_\_Six children, eighteen grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren survive him. The sons and daughters are William Southam, Berea; Corbett Southam, Elyria captain of police; Fred Southam, Memphis, Tennessee; Mrs. Blanche Wedel, Strongsville; Mrs. Edith Dunlea, Berea; and Mrs Edna Reil, Fremont, Ohio.\_\_Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. on Thursday afternoon in the Haag Funeral Home. Betsy Friend Southam was born in Devonshire, England, Dec 22, 1814, where she spent her childhood days much the same as all young people. \_\_In the year 1831, her father sold his

possessions in England. At the age of 17, with her parents, four brothers, and two sisters, all of whom, except the youngest, Mr. Jas. Friend, of Michigan, have passed to the spiritland, she came to America settling in Royalton, Cuyahoga Co. on a farm. July 4, 1835, she was married to Henry Southam. \_\_For twenty-five years they made their home in Strongsville; then wishing for better educational advantages for their children, they moved to Berea. They were blessed with a large family, five of whom passed away while mere babes, while six grew up to manhood and womanhood. Helen, their oldest daughter, was the first taken from them. Then the father, of whom it could be truthfully said, "None knew him but to love him," passed away. The next to be called hence was Ella, the youngest of the family, who seemed yet to have scarcely passed from girlhood.\_\_"Leaves have their time to Fall\_And flowers to wither at the north wind's breath; And stars to set, but all - Thou hast all seasons for thine own, O Death." Betsy Southam was reared in the Church of England. At the age of 21, she, with her husband, united with the Methodist church at Bennetts Corners. Upon moving to Berea, they transferred their membership to the Berea M.E. church, where they remained faithful members until called. "It is enough, come up higher."\_\_Fifty-three years ago, she was made a life member of the Foreign Missionary Society, in which she took an active interest until advancing years made it impossible for her to longer attend. During the Crusade Movement in Berea, she was one of the first to respond to duty's call, and in later years, was an earnest supporter of the Berea W.C.T.U. of which she was a charter member, and in which she retained her membership until her death. \_(Source: The Berea Enterprise, 12 Jan 1906)

Aged Berea Woman Dead\_Mrs. Betsy Southam, Ninety-one, Left large Number of Grandchildren\_Berea, O., Dec. 31. – Mrs. Betsy Southam, one of Berea's oldest residents, died yesterday. Mrs. Southam was born in Devonshire, England, Dec 21, 1814, and when seventeen years of age moved with her parents to America and subsequently located in Royalton township, Ohio.\_\_The deceased, whose maiden name was Betsy Friend, married Henry Southam, moving into Strongsville township. In moving into 1860 Mr. and Mrs. Southam moved to Berea and she made this her home up to the time of her death. Mr. Southam died in 1879, leaving her considerable wealth. Mrs. Southam was a woman of ability, managing her own business affairs until she was seized by an attack of pneumonia, which caused her death. \_\_She was generally known around this vicinity as "Grandma" Southam and merits this title as will be seen from the fact of her leaving seventeen grand-children, thirty great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild. In addition to the above grandchildren Mrs. Southam is survived by one son, Edwin Southam of Berea, and three daughters, Mrs. John Tell of Greenport, N.T.; Mrs. W. W. Salisbury and Mrs. T. Death of Henry Southam\_Mr. Henry Southam, for the last nineteen years an esteemed citizen of Berea, passed away Sabbath evening, Jan 26th, at the ripe old age of 74. His health had been poor for some two years or more, but it was not until a few weeks ago that it became apparent that he was gradually failing, and that the days of his pilgrimage on earth were nearing the end. \_\_The disease of which he died was one of acute suffering, yet he bore it all without a murmur; he had already outlived the allotted age of man and that he was ready and willing to go and be at rest. The end came on Sabbath evening just as the village bells had tolled the hour of worship, his spirit quietly winged its flight to the heavenly sanctuary, "Where congregations ne'er break up and Sabbaths have no end."\_He leaves a widow and five children: Mrs. Thirza Heath, Mrs. Libbie Tenbroeck, Miss Clara, Miss Ella, and Mr. E. Southam, all of Berea. \_\_Mr. Southam was a native of Gloucestershire, England; he received his education in the college at Cambridge; emigrated to America about 43 years ago, and settled in Cleveland, where he lived for a number of years. In 1836 he was married to Miss Betsy Friend, and shortly afterwards purchased a farm in Strongsville; he, subsequently filled the position of bookkeeper for the firm of Ross & Lemon, Cleveland, and nineteen years ago came to Berea, where he has since resided. \_\_He was converted under Rev. Hugh Parish 35 years ago, and joined the M.E. Church, and has remained a member ever since. He was an honest and industrious citizen, and won the respect and esteem of all who knew him. His advice to his children and his motto through life, was to "always do right." His request was, to be laid away without any expense or parade. He was a kind and affectionate father and husband, and a good neighbor. \_\_The funeral was attended yesterday morning at the M.E. Church, the pastor, Rev. J.M.
