FIRST ANNUAL TECHNOLOGY WEEK AWARDS DINNER HONORS TECHNOLOGY TEAMS EXCELLANCE. ONE OF THE TWO ENVIRONMENT AND SAFETY AWARDS GOES TO RIEL TEAM. OCTOBER 26 - AWARDS CEREMONY AND BANQUET

Several months ago Rohr Industries, Inc. initiated the first of what is planned as an annual Technology Week. The week long celebration is intended to highlight the importance of new technology as the cornerstone for the future success of the company. Prior to the actual celebration all employees were invited to submit to a team of judges special technical accomplishments which have contributed to the success of the Company. A series of 14 categories were defined. Some of the more important ones included Computing Application, Cost Reduction, Engineering Design, Environment and Safety, Material Applications, New Technology and Product Quality. Each team submitted a short description of the work accomplished and how that accomplishment benefited the Company. Each team also put together a poster display outlining accomplishments, along with supporting information in the form of photographs, charts, sample hardware, etc. The judges selected approximately 15 teams as winners, and each team member was presented with a trophy as a part of the Awards Dinned.


The Riel team included two additional Rohr employees, Bd Delaney, Research Chemist, Chula Vista, and Tuyet Vuong, Research Engineer, Riverside. The award was based on the team's accomplishment of altering chemically a commercially available high temperature resin in order to remove a toxic and cancer causing substance it contains. This alteration consisted of chemically combining a portion of the toxic material with one of the ingredients of the system, and the balance of the toxic substance with the other ingredient. These two new compounds are both non-toxic and non cancer causing, as shown by testing. It was demonstrated that the two new substances could be combined to produce a resin system identical to the one produced by the standard product. This new system eliminates the need for special controlled access production facilities, protective garments for workers, and health protection in case of an accidental release of material. Not only does the company achieve substantial cost savings, but the good health of the workers is assured. Three patents were issued recently, and an agreement has been signed with one of the largest chemical



companies in the USA to scale up and sell the new product. Rohr will receive royalty payments on all sales, thus recovering the cost of the development.
