ALPINE - The annual Riel New Years Day Christmas celebration was held on January 1, 1992 at the Alpine country estate home of Bob and Karla Riel. The feature event was the newly established Riel Bowl. Unlike other bowl games, the Riel Bowl was planned as a multi-event contest, including football, soccer and golf. Unfortunately, the football and soccer matches had to be canceled, due to the muddy condition of the playing field. This was a great disappointment for the Kids team, since they were counting on getting revenge for the disputed Thanksgiving day soccer match loss. The golf match went off as planned, however, and was a great success. Although the Kids team did not have a chance to participate in any organized games, golf turned out to be very popular, and there were many fine shots produced by all who tried out their skills. Some no doubt will grow up to be excellent golfers.

RIEL BOWL TO BE HELD IN ALPINE TODAY

The first ever Riel Bowl will be held in Alpine today. The event will cap off a week long celebration that started Christmas day and continued on until early this morning.
