

THIS MONTHS CHALLENGE

For October we have selected four match puzzles for your entertainment. Playing with matches is what we teach our children not to do, yet it's a form of recreation with a long tradition. Many of the matchstick puzzles that appear repeatedly in modern puzzle books go back to the volume "Streichholzspiele" ("matchstick games"), by Sophus Tromholt, published in Leipzig in 1889. How much earlier the puzzles were invented is anybody's guess.








Move two matches to produce four identical squares. (Interestingly, most people who've solved this puzzle have trouble doing it again when the zigzag is reversed.)

2. TIC-TAC-TOB



This tic-tac-toe grid contains 12 matchsticks. Move three matches to produce three identical squares. (There are several solutions)

3. AS RASY AS 1-2-3



Remove three matches to leave three triangles.

4. NEW MATH



This equation in Roman numerals (9 - 12 = 3) is obviously incorrect. Move one match to produce a correct equation. (The solution does not involve creating an inequality sign.)

This poem is illustrated by the author. Unfortunately, we do not have space to copy the pictures. Maybe we can fit them into a later issue.






