2nd ANNUAL RIEL BOWL CELEBRATED IN ALPINE

ONG SHOTS DOMINATE CLOSEST TO PIN GOLF CONTEST. LOSERS DEMAND INVESTIGATION INTO CHARGES OF HANDICAP FIXING

KIDS ENJOY RIDES ON UNCLE BOB'S SANTA SLEIGH

January 1, 1993 was another day of family celebration. With the exception of Richard, Liz and JJ, who were out of town, the whole family showed up at the Bob and Karla country estate in Alpine for the second annual Riel Bowl. The party started at about 10:00 AM, with informal games by the various kid, as they arrived. In addition to the tossing of footballs, a lot of golf shots were made in preparation for the official contest scheduled for later on in the afternoon. Lunch consisted of a delicious beef roast expertly cooked by Bob and Karla, along with ham, salads, candied yams and an assortment of drinks. After lunch the official closest to the hole golf contest was held. All of the contestants were assigned handicaps, in terms of inches. By this system the best of three shots could be moved nearer to the hole by the number if inches assigned. In addition Las Vegas style odds were posted on each contestant. Bd Riel, a 10:1 shot with a 10" handicap, came in second. However, not all of the odds were wrong, since the closest without handicap was won by Grandma Riel, who put her best shot only about 3" from the hole. The losers had considerable to say about the extremely high handicaps assigned to certain individuals, and threatened to call for a congressional investigation into the validity of the handicap assignment process. However, it was decided that no action can be taken once the contest was over. Nevertheless. Bob Gillingham was heard to mutter in a low voice "just wait till next year, I'll show them how to play this game"

The next item on the agenda was the opening of gifts for the kids. This activity can best be described as controlled bedlam, but somehow or other a measure of order prevailed and everyone got his presents on schedule. The highlight of the presentations was the handing out of the new T-shirts with the new RFNL logo on the front. Bach family had it's own color, and all family names were printed on the back. 
JUNIORS - Find the word at the top of the page which best fits the animal shown in the drawing.


The second entry, submitted by the Benesch family, shows an interesting concept of the leisure life, with a golf course theme. It fit the masthead well, and was strongly considered.


The third entry was not signed, so we don't know who sent it in. However, it too does not fit well into the mast head, and was ruled out on that account.

2ND ANNUAL RIEL BOWL STUNNED BY MESSAGE

Last week Riel bowl officials were stunned when a Wells Fargo agent delivered a package that was sent over 450 years ago. Although the contents have not been made public, RFNL reporters were able to get a copy of the letter that accompanied it.

The letter written in french and authenticated by experts at the history department of UCSD, is from Louis Riel, a French Monarch of the mid 1550's and patriarch of the modern day Riel Family.

Apparently the letter was written on the advice of a family friend named "Norty" who was concerned over the possibility of a major rift developing within the famous Riel heritage.
