#### Call him Doctor Bob

#### The long and winding road from bus driver to doctor of education

Gillingham began driving a bus for Francis Parker School in 1973, he thought it would be a good job while he completed his undergraduate work at San Diego State University. At that

time, his vision for the future did not include teaching at Parker, let alone being part of the administrative team. In fact, Bob had no interest in administration

work whatsoever. Like many people, however, he was to learn that the bus doesn't always stop where we thought it would.

Bob notes, too, that he wasn't the only one who went for an extended ride on the big yellow bus. Debbie Burzynski, Parker's director of transportation, was also driving a bus at the time, while studying for a degree in speech therapy. He considers the fact that they both ended up staying at Parker an indication of the school's

"I had been teaching in Spring Valley for a few years when I heard about a fifth grade opening at Parker,"

When Lower School Head Bob he remembers. He also notes with some irony how then Headmaster Doug Crone told him he could expect to spend about five years at Parker before seeking additional

professional challenges. Actually, Bob spent the next seven years at Parker before deciding to move on to some-

thing else. Only the move wasn't very far - just across the valley to the Middle School, where he taught sixth grade English for the next

three vears. Throughout his teaching years, Bob says he never had any intentions of becoming an administrator. "I never

understood why anyone would want to be an administrator," he said. "Until Ierral Miles explained some of the professional challenges and rewards." Upon earning his administrative

credential from Pt. Loma College, the professors there urged him to consider a doctoral program. Late last year Northern Arizona University informed him that he had been granted a Ed.D. degree, making him a doctor of education.

When he thinks back to that time that he was told he would probably leave after a few years, Bob realizes just how far he has come. "The institution grows on you," he says. "For me it's a place where I have grown professionally. It's been tremendously interesting to see the school not just from this perspective, but also from across the valley."

Acknowledging that one challenge often leads to another, he says he spends much of his day problem solving, always keeping the focus on doing what's best for the students of Parker.




