MEETING HELD AT YORK UNIVERSITY, TORONTO, CANADA

The title of her presentation was "Cross-Classroom on the Learning Electronic Frontier, or, John Dewey in the Information Age" The President of the University then added her welcoming remarks, and the meeting then proceeded with its planned program. The format of the meeting consisted of a series of informal panel discussion groups who met to discuss their own ideas and experiences. The meeting lasted for three days, and Margaret commented that it seemed like old times in college, since they were housed in the student dormitory during their stay in Toronto. 


### SOME TRAVEL NEWS - BRETT STRIKES IT RICH IN NEVADA




