

TEAM PLAY-OFF GAMES DOMINATE SPORTS NEWS

Baseball, soccer and soft ball teams were much in the recent news. As reported in the July issue, Margaret, Bud and family took off for Hawaii recently, for a combination vacation and kids soccer tournament. We have the following account from sports reporter Margaret.

LIGHTNING WINS HAWAII CUP IN SUDDEN DEATH OVERTIME by Margaret Riel

Kim Scott's Boys Under 14 soccer team scored a thrilling come-from-behind 5-4 victory over Team Hawaii to win the Hawaii Cup soccer tournament in Maui, Hawaii on July 29, 1995. Playing on a wind swept field, the Lightning found themselves down 4-0 with only 12 minutes to play in the championship game. Two goals by Dan Miller and one each by Ian Gere and Brett Mills drew the Leucadia team even with the all star team from the Big Island as regulation time ran out. With momentum now on their side, the Lightning staved off Team Hawaii attacks in the first sudden-death period. With the fierce wind at their backs in the second over-time period the Lightning struck. Dustin D'Artenny netted a penalty kick from 35 yards out to bring the Hawaii Cup trophy home to North County.

Undefeated in the tournament, the Lightning beat the Back Bay Bombers from Newport Beach 6-1, the Makawao Strikers from Maui 2-1, Diamond Head from Ohau 4-0 in pool play and the Maui Thunderballs 2-0 in the semi-finals. Showing the lightning versatility, 7 players scored. Dan Miller had 6 goals, Brett Miles 4, Corey Scott 3, Ian Gere and Justin D'Artenay had 2 each. David Ginge and Rickey Usher added a goal each.

The mid-field play of Brian Cox, Ryan Mislolek, Mike Suor and Michael Riel-Mehan contributed to the Lightnings 3+ goals-per-game average, while the defense of Mike Cameron, Scott Baldwin, Rickey Usher and Alex Rock helped hold opponents to a goal per game. Coach Scott was especially pleased with goalkeeper Andrew Gordon's daring defense of his goal during the 4 day tournament.

We congratulate Michael for his fine play and the way his team came from behind to win the final game.

Margaret also reported that they enjoyed their Hawaii vacation, but were happy to get home after all of their recent travels.

Brett Sorem won a place on the Tecolote Bronco all star baseball team, the Bulldogs, and they ended up winning the district and sectional championships. This qualified them for the regional tournament, held in Perris, California, July 22-26. Although they won 4 out of 6 games they finished in third place, losing twice to the final winner, Whittier. TECOLOTE BRONCOS 1ST, 3RD IN DISTRICT by Francie Castro

The Tecolote Bulldog all-stars, after capturing the district championship in four straight games at North City in Clairmont, went on to defeat the 2nd place North City team in the sectional finals. They had to beat them twice in a double header, 3-2 in regulation 7 innings and then in a 12 inning 3 hour 40 minute final the Bulldogs pulled it out with a final score of 4-2. In the 10th inning their arch rival 2nd seed North City team had the bases loaded with no outs and the Bulldogs managed to work out of it. This victory gave them an invitation to the regional championship in Perris, Ca. They lost their first game 2-0, but went on to win the next 5 games in four days, playing in 90-100 degree weather. Unfortunately (or fortunately, depending on whether you were talking to the player or the driver) they were defeated by Whittier to miss the finals by one game. GOOD JOB BULLDOGS! There were many tremendous plays by all. Brett was used at various times at 2nd, 3rd, left and right field. He made one outstanding over the shoulder catch of a line drive bullet in a regional game clutch situation. NICE GOING. BRETT!

We certainly want to add our own congratulations to both Michael and Brett for their parts in the successes enjoyed by their teams. As we have mentioned before, one of the important lessons one learns in any team sport is how to play your role in a situation where you have to work within a group in order to achieve a goal. 

After all that one can do, imagine how much can be done with two. Two to four, and four to eight, to bring back some love and erase some hate.


