

LISTY GILLINGHAM SPEAKING TOUR FINALIZED

In the last issue of RFNL we mentioned the speaking tours Listy will be making in November and December of this year. We now have the full story on this subject. There will be four one day sessions, each lasting from 8:30 a.m. to 3:15 p.m. The first session will be in Indianapolis, IN, on November 25, the second in Cincinnati, OH, on the 26th. After a break at home the third session will be at Columbia, SC, on December 16th, and the final one in Nashville, TN, on the 17th. The company sponsoring the tour is the Institute for Educational Development, PO Box 718, Madina, WA, and they have prepared, with assistance from Listy, an eight page brochure defining the objectives and scope of the program. Two of the pages are reproduced below, and as you can see Listy is the featured star of the entire program. In addition to organizing the content of the presentations, Listy also has put together

each of the teachers in the class. The handout contains "Tricks of the Trade" - methods for effectively teaching math concepts, especially algebraic and geometric concepts, Games - strategies for reviewing concepts and reinforcing math concepts, Projects - ideas for connecting algebra and geometry to real-world situations and Investigations - openended problems to help students work collaboratively. The course fee is \$150.00 for each person. Listy is paid on a schedule associated with the number of persons in attendance, plus travel expenses.




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


JESSICA AND DUSTIN STAR IN CYT SONG AND DANCE ROUTINE

MISSION HILLS HISTORY - HOW WE GOT HERE FROM THERE

We have space in this issue to continue our account of the history of the Mission Hills area. In previous issues the life style of the original inhabiter, the Kumeyaay (KOOM-yi) Indians was described, along with the arrival of the first "Zonies" (from Arizona), another Indian tribe, the Yumans. In the last segment, in the November 1995 issue, the arrival of Juan Cabrillo and Father Junipera Serra is introduced, in the chapter "East Meets West".

EAST MEETS WEST (CONT)

In a letter dated July 23, 1769, Father Serra describes the Kumeyaay as, "most friendly and all the men...go about naked while the women, little girls, and even babies at the breast, are decently covered...They treated us with confidence and good will as if they had known us all their lives."

In an earlier letter Father Serra wrote, "All the male heathens go naked, with nothing more than what nature provides...Both men and women go very much painted; the men have the cartilage of their noses pierced, from which hangs sea-shells. They are very well armed with quiver and bow. All the heathens here are very lively and great traders.

Expedition engineer Miguel Costanso said he found the Kumeyaay to be "friendly and gentle, living in stone and brush shanties with reed roofs." He adds there is an "enclosure made of boughs and tree trunks where they (the Kumeyaay) took refuge against attack."

On July 16, 1769, Portola founded the Presidio of San Diego and Father Serra founded the first of his California missions.

What happened next is unclear. County historian Percy Broell, who in 1927/28 excavated and mapped part of the old presidio, said the "Indians" moved after the Presidio was established. This is possible since historian Winifred Davidson, a contemporary of Broell's, suggested the village of Cosoy was for summer use only. She believed the Kumeyaay moved each winter to the oak forests located in the mountains of east San Diego County.

Whether the Kumeyaay moved or stayed, one thing is certain; they were plagued by European diseases (measles, smallpox, syphilis) which decimated and dispersed them.



CHANGING HANDS

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In our area, European settlement was pretty much confined inside the Presidio walls. Like the Kumeyaay before them, the Spanish settlers looked to the sea for fish and to Mission Hills for wild game. In 1834 Mexico assumed control and built a pueblo at the foot of the Presidio.

After the American conquest (1846) the village was incorporated in 1850 as Old Town. The new city of San Diego was laid out in 1867 by Alonzo Horton, the man called "The Father of San Diego". Modern Mission Hills history began two years later.

INSPIRATION

In 1869 the actions of three men, two of them newly arrived in San Diego, would start the creation of the new neighborhood known today as Mission hills.
