


# **Listy runs in Boston Marathon**

# Bob and Listy enjoy holiday in Boston

The big sports news for this month is the story on Listy and Bob in Boston for the big marathon. Listy has been training for years



in order to qualify for this most famous of all the marathon races. We have the following on the spot report from Listy herself, which we print as follows.

I'm back, and here's the total report:

I survived....hurray! The run was the most exciting run I've ever done for lots of reasons, but most of all because of the number of people involved and the quality of the runners. Everyone was fit and ready to run (no wimpy walkers in your way) even on heartbreak hill. That was impressive. The start was slow, but what do you expect when you are in the 13th corral? Usually (for SD) I'm in the 5th corral with a variety of runners. In Boston I'm in the 13th and they're almost all women (age 40) because we all had the same qualifying time...weird...but good. One third of the field was women, 2/3 rds men (in comparison to SD with over 50% women)...I usually end up in the top 25% in SD...in Boston I was in the top 66%....(just a little different placing)....but I did place and made the newspaper cut even in Boston (they report the top 13,000 runners....out of 18,000 qualifying runners).

Running downtown towards the finish was amazing....thousands of people in layers lined the sidewalks, balconies, etc. You felt like a winner/competitor/athlete in just running.

The weather was not Listy-friendly...strong head winds and very cold (wind chill factor brought it down to the 20's), but people still lined the entire course and I just decided to enjoy the experience and high five as many kids hands as I could as I was running along. Coming into the finish, I saw Bob and gave him and all the other people near him the "high five-I've made itvictory slap" before running the last four blocks to the big finish...what an experience...one I'll never forget.

Having Bob there made all the difference. Wish you all could have been there because seeing it live is nothing like what you've read or heard about. It was weird running through Wellsley College (half way point). I had heard about the women

screaming, but I didn't expect to hear the echo before I got there...that was really cool as was running by Boston College and all the little towns.

That's my full report... Listy

We had a chance to talk to Listy and Bob after they came home, and he reported that he was so enthralled by the marathon experience that he decided to go into training at once,



to qualify for next years race. After a week of training, however, he said that he may scale down his ambition to something more modest, perhaps the New York Marathon.

Whatever happens in the future, however, we are so proud of Listy and the dedication she exhibited in meeting the race requirement. When asked if she was going to retire from the marathon circuit she replied "Cowles Mountain here I come!!!

The trip home was another matter, however. Their flight home was delayed, then cancelled, and they finally made it home about a day later than scheduled. Anyway, welcome home!!
