July was a big month on the travel front, and we have the following first hand reports. Margaret provided the following account, with pictures.

MARGARET AND BUD JOIN CONFUCIAN ORDER

During the time that Margaret, Megan, and Bud were in Bejing, China for an international telecommunications conference, they were convinced to join a Confucian religious order by local religious zealots. Margaret said that she was overwhelmed by the purity of thought associated with the religious group. Bud said it was the heat-temperatures ranging from 95-115 degrees while they were there.



When Margaret was not accosting people arriving on planes to join their new sect, she participated in the 7th Annual I*learn Conference. The conference is composed of teachers involved in the "ministry" of education from 60 countries. They all share ideas about ways to improve teaching, especially concerning vital social issues such as racial conflict, world health, hunger, exploitation of child labor, and preservation of the environment. The teachers and their students use the internet as a means of communication and to design exciting educational activities.

Megan, too, participated in a conference while in Bejing- the

4 th Annual I*earn Youth Summit. Students from around the world met in daily workshops to report on their educational experiences and to plan future socially-relevant educational activities. Megan renewed friendships with past participants and made new friends as well. She also found time to teach local Chinese residents some swing dance steps and to dance 'till dawn in the conference disco.

Serving as "designated spouse", Bud had slightly more freedom to visit Tienanmen Square while Megan and

The most striking memory Bud and Margaret report is the juxtaposition of abject poverty and the most modern of office buildings. Bejing is extremely clean and punctual and inexpensive transport costing. .12 for the busses and .40 for the underground. The underground runs 31 miles from the eastern to the western edge of the city of 12 million.

Mission Hills-How We Got Here From There

We have room for another chapter in the history of our neighborhood, as follows.

The Space Race

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The last of the Mission Hills development took place after the war. Remaining service personnel joined in the quest for housing with those who had come to San Diego during the war. Many could not afford to live in Mission Hills, but their presence pushed prices higher and created a "space race."

It was also a time of changing values and images. Author Oakly Hall would come back from the war to write "The Corpus of Joe Baily" in 1953. The book challenged the image of propriety in Mission Hills and caused an immediate sensation among residents. Some even talked about running the 1934 graduate of Grant Elementary out of town. Finding gasoline to do the running was getting less convenient though. After the war there were at least five full service stations in Mission Hills. That would drop to one self-service station within 30 years.
