

Mehan family builds Taj Mahal in Encinitas




As you can plainly see, the famous Taj Mahal in India has been relocated in Encinitas. Actually, the above photo was

Mission Hills- How We Got Here From There

But that wasn't a big problem; (lack of gasoline stations) Mission Hillians would simply go for gas on their way to do the shopping. You see, the shopping mall phenomenon was arriving and it would have the same kind of impact on the way people lived in Mission Hills as Portola's arrival did on the Kumeyaay.

Time Out For

A Huddle

One effect of the shopping mall syndrome was the loss of dining choices in Mission Hills. By the early 70's, almost all restaurants in the area had closed. Down to the last one. The Huddle was bought by Geaoge Babcock and Quent Pearson of Ideas, Incorporated. The antique dealers said it wouldn't be a neighborhood without a place to eat. They sold it as soon as they found a buyer who promised to keep it open. Today Mission Hills is home to some of the finest restaurants in San Diego but 20 years ago there were almost none.

Business closings were nothing new for Mission Hills. In the early 50's, Piggly Wiggly moved out of its Goldfinch location. (Furniture Outlet is located in that space.) Then Richard Brewers Variety opened. Two decades later he closed after the Food Basket (now the Lucky store on West Washington) opened saying the store should be

called, "General Basket since it sells so many of the same things I do." Over the same period, the dime store on West Lewis also closed. It was also hard getting home service as doctors stopped making house calls and grocery stores stopped home deliveries and offering free credit. The milkman was also fading from the scene. In modern America, to get anything required getting into the car first. The trolley tracks which had caused the area to blossom were covered or removed. The electric cars which had brought thousands of residents and shoppers into Mission Hills were replaced with gasoline powered cars which carried thousands out of their neighborhood, killing one local business after another. Residents fell in love with their cars and presumed lower prices at the shopping malls without weighing what they were giving up in their own back yards. Nature felt the changes as well.

The Legend Of The

White Deer

A white Fallow deer, native to southern Europe, was born in the San Diego Zoo in April 1965. The zoo had too many of her species so she was sold as surplus to Riley Stanly. He owned a ranch in Mission Valley and the deer was taken to a corral there. Then, in November, she and a buck made it out of the enclosure and into the hills, Mission Hills specifically.

Stanley tried to catch her but never could. The buck disappeared, but the doe took up permanent residence in Mission Hills where she was a big hit. It was decided to leave her alone.

Some called her White Deer, others called her Lucy.

The deer could be seen grazing in the hills as motorists drove Interstate 8. It was also routine to see the doe walking in the middle of Pine Street which is close to her favorite spot in Presidio Park: Inspiration Point, the highest point in the park. It's at this highest point where White Deer is buried today.

It happened on December 31, 1975. Officials received Many calls from people saying the deer were trying to cross the freeway. Two animal control officers were sent to the scene.
