

## RFNL INTERVIEW OF ROBERT RIEL, NEW DYNALECTRIC VP

Last January we reported on the promotion of Robert, and promised an interview. The first interview was ruined by a recorder malfunction, but we were successful on the second try, so here it is.

Interview date - March 24, 2001

RFNL - When and under what circumstances were you notified of this promotion?



It was at the Christmas party and they had a special announcement - a couple of hundred were at the party and it was announced by the president.

RFNL - Can you give us a summary of the Dynalectric organization, business scope, and business objectives? Also, what is the relationship between Dynalectric and

Dynalectric is a nation-wide business owned by the Emcor Corp., with about \$3 billion in sales this year. They do electrical and mechanical contracting. We have offices all across the USA and up and down the coast here. DIT stands for Dynalectric Information Technologies. That involves fire alarms, security, telephone, building automation - all that sort of thing. We are a separate entity of Dynalectric and a lot of times we are a sub, and sometimes we work for other electrical contractor as well.

RFNL - What roles will you play as a new company vice-president?

Basically, my title of vice president is in recognition of my role as the leader of the Technology Division. It gives me more authority to do things such as sign contracts up to a million dollars, different things like that, and hire people. Basically, I have my own company within a company, if you will.

RFNL - Will your new duties involve more business travel than you have done in the past?

Probably about the same. This year I have several meetings to attend, some in Vancouver, some in Las Vegas, one in Washington, D.C., and various little ones that are one or two nighters.

RFNL - How many employees will be working under your direct supervision?

Well, when I started DIT it was myself and one person. Now I am up to about 30 - 35 people and within a few more weeks we are going to be hiring a lot more people, and I will have about 50 working for me.

RFNL - How do you view the future of the electrical contracting business in the San Diego area and countrywide?

Electrical itself will stay fairly modest in growth, somewhere between 5 and 8%. But the area I work in, Information Technology, that growth market seems to be somewhere in the 20 - 30 % range. As a technology area it seems to have more work. Many buildings now have wiring in them, for electrical, that was done 50 years ago and still works. But when you talk about technology, it has a life cycle of only about 5 - 8 years, so there is a lot more work doing it that way.

RFNL - Does Dynalectric have international activities and/or ambitions? If so, how do you view the potential in various areas of the world?

Well, actually we are worldwide. We are in Canada, London, we've got work In Kuwait, we have a full agreement with the South African Government to do facilities maintenance, we've got work going on in Puerto Rico, and in Hawaii. I may travel from place to place, although not too much (DIT) work is going on right now, as far as international is concerned. However, I have done some work in Mexico.

RFNL - Do you have any advice or suggestions for young people with respect to career options?

With all due respect to Margaret, Francie, Carol, Listy, and Birdy, my loving sisters, college is good for some people, but there are lots of other opportunities. What it amounts to is if you don't do what you like or love don't bother doing it because you'll never do it well. So I would say that you find out what you really like to do and do it. That's hard to do but it can be done. Obviously, I didn't go to college like the rest of my brothers and sisters, but I think that I turned out OK.

The newspaper article describes the background for Susan's book. Working as a librarian at Winthrop University, Susan (left, in picture) and her associate, Lois Walker came



across a government document which summarized the 1822 Denmark Vesey slave insurrection trials that were supposed to calm the fears of pre-Civil War South

Carolina. The report highlighted the role of one of the coconspirators, Gullah Jack Pritchard, and the book "A Documentated History of Gullah Jack Pritchard and the Denmark Vesey Insurrection of 1822" tells his story. According to the report Gullah played a key role in the insurrection plot. Vesey's insurrection destroyed the prevailing myth that slaves were content and prompted a backlash by white Charlestonians that laid the groundwork for the state's rights movement. This movement ultimately culminated in the Civil War. The plotters planned to break into a government storage place, seize weapons and kill all the whites in Charleston. The plot failed, however, when one of the recruits to the cause reported the plot to his master. In May of 1822 the authorities arrested 117 slaves and 11 free black men. By the time the episode was over, 41 were hanged, including Vesey. Gullah Jack was still at large, but was caught, tried, and hung in July, 1822. The rest were banished from South Carolina. Charleston authorities then petitioned the state Legislature for a larger military force. Soon afterward, an arsenal was established at The Citadel, which was converted to a military school in 1842. The Legislator also passed the Negro Seaman's Act, which forbade any black seaman, slave or free, from coming ashore in Charleston. This act was greeted with outrage by European nations, who argued that the act violated international law. The people in Charleston said "We don't care what the federal government says, we are making our own laws." This was when the whole issue of state's rights started.

Congratulations, Susan, for sharing with us this interesting item of history, and a job well done.
