

ATTACK ON AMERICA



I suppose that everything that can be said about the September 11th attack has already been said, not once, but many times. As one who was 23 years old and already in the service, I clearly recall the emotions felt on the morning of December 7, 1941. Everyone was in a state of shock, grief and most of all anger at what happened at far off Pearl Harbor. However, the country was already on a wartime footing. Most of us realized that in all likelihood our country would eventually be drawn into armed conflicts with the forces of evil in Europe and the Far East. Pearl Harbor merely established the date. What happened on September 11th was in many ways more of a shock than that felt in 1941. Although violence in the Middle East has been in the news for some time, somehow or other the feeling was strong that it could not be exported to our own land. We were terribly wrong, hence he emotions



on that day were felt even more strongly than in 1941.

On December 23, 1776 a famous American patriot spoke out in the cause of freedom from foreign domination. His name was Thomas Paine, and he published an article called "COMMON SENSE" on that date. His thoughts helped rally the people to the defense of their country, and much that he wrote rings true in the challenge we face today. I have repeated a few small segments of his essay, for your reflection.

THESE are the times that try men's souls. The summer soldier and the sunshine patriot will, in this crisis, shrink from the service of their country; but he that stands it now, deserves the love and thanks of man and woman. Tyranny, like hell, is not easily conquered; yet we have this consolation with us, that the harder the conflict, the more glorious the triumph. What we obtain too cheap, we esteem too lightly; it is dearness only that gives everything its' value. Heaven knows how to put a proper price on its' goods; and it would be strange indeed if so celestial an article as FREEDON should not be highly rated.

....I have as little superstition in me as any man living, but my secret opinion has ever been, and still is, that God Almighty will not give up a people to military destruction, or leave them to unsupportedly perish, who have so earnestly and so repeatedly sought to avoid the calamities of war, by every decent method which wisdom could invent. Neither have I so much of the infedel in me, as to suppose that he has relinquished the government of the world, and given us up to the care of devils; and as I do not, I cannot see on what grounds they can look up to high heaven for help against us: a common murderer, a highwayman, or a house-breaker has as good a pretense as he.

....My own line of reasoning is to myself as straight and clear as a ray of light. Not all the treasures of the world, so far as I believe, could have induced me to support an offensive war, for I think it murder; but if a thief breaks into my house, burns and destroys my property, and kills or threatens to kill me, or those who are in it, am I to suffer it? What signifies it to me, whether he is a king or a common man; my countryman or not my countryman; whether it is done by an individual villian or an army of them? If we reason to the root of things we shall find no difference; neither can any just cause be assigned why we should punish in one case and pardon in the other....

...I thank God that I fear not. I see no cause for fear. I know our situation well, and can see our way out of it...

When this country declared war on the Axis Powers in 1941 we faced up to large military forces manned by well equipped soldiers totally dedicated to their leadership and a vast industrial complex mobilized to supply them with the weapons needed to replace those lost in battle. In addition, the enemy heads of state had succeeded in capturing the minds of the general population to the degree that they supported wholeheartedly the evil goals and policies established by their leaders. In 1941 this country was poorly prepared to face up to this challenge. Although lacking in military prowess, the country rallied to the challenge. Whatever opposition to war there was evaporated on the morning of December 7th, and the people set out to do whatever was needed to meet the challenge.

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Today we face another challenge to our way of life. The enemy controls only a small and ill-equipped military force. They operate from a country whose leadership is supportive but commands only marginal support from a population suffering from famine and untold hardships. Literally millions have fled their homes for refuge in neighboring lands, where they live in refugee camps with little to sustain them. There exists in the country active forces of opposition that control a portion of the land and seek the overthrow of the present leaders. Although supported, to some degree, by a few other countries and ideologies, this new enemy stands mostly alone from an outraged world. He has virtually no industrial capacity to support his objectives. His only real weapon is a group of individuals who are eager to sacrifice their lives for a cause they are totally committed to, and will gladly continue the to carry out acts like those of the September 11th attack. Surely we can overcome this threat to our country, providing we are unified and dedicated to do so. Unfortunately, however, the defeat of the prime enemy individual will not conclude the hostilities. After he has been disposed of there are others of like mind that will attempt to continue the policies he has initiated. Therefore, we must persevere until we have destroyed all who threaten the world with their evil acts.

As Thomas Paine so aptly said, 225 years ago "I thank God that I fear not. I see no cause for fear. I know our situation well, and can see our way out of it."
