
Ed Riel Family enjoys Thanksgiving with Tim in San Francisco

I have some exciting news to tell you. As you might know, I quit my job at AAA Auto Club recently because they were too many hours (about 35 per week). Well, I decided it was time to move on and I

started looking for a new job. I am currently a biology major at SDSU and I tried looking for a job on campus. Through many applications and e-mails to the bio department faculty, I was offered a job in Dr. Krisans lab at school. The lab is looking at the different enzymes in the peroxisomes that are a part of the formation of cholesterol. The cholesterol is formed in the endoplasmic reticulum. However, the enzymes of the peroxisomes (and lysomes) are involved in the end product yet their actual roles are unknown. I am a lab assistant and do small tasks such as making tissue culture media, autoclaving (disinfecting at high pressure), washing test tubes, and doing some small experiments including western blots and gel electrophoresis (with supervision). For what I am doing I am impressed at what they are paying me (\$8.50/hr). This job has a lot of potential for growth. With time, I hope to be able to be in charge of different experiments and gather my own results. The only down side to the job is that it only offers me 10 hours a week. So, in order to make rent, I found a second job.

I was offered a job at the Salk Institute in the Peptide Biology Lab (PBL). The principal investigator is Catherine Rivier and the main scientist is Dr. Soon Lee. At Salk I do multiple things. I perform perfusions, brain extractions, brain cross-sectioning, put the brain cross-sections on slides, develop the slides, and stain them. I also make different buffer solutions, perform Northern blots and gel electrophoresis and some PCR (polymerase chain reaction) procedures (replicating a lot of DNA in a short amount of time). Because the company is non-profit, I get paid \$1.50 less than I do at SDSU but it is worth it because of the experience I am gaining. At the moment I don't know what I want to do with myself after college so this is a great way to help me figure it out. I am learning about biology in the world of academia and also in biotech. I am really excited about all of this and I look forward to everything that I will be learning. I have been blessed in so many ways with the opportunities that have presented themselves and the people in my life...it makes it all so exciting. (Plus... I no longer work weekends, nights, or holidays.)

I know that some of this is confusing, so if you have any questions just email me. Hopefully I'll hear from you soon.

I performed simple tasks, but in doing so I learned about science and chose a lifetime profession, a decision that to this day I have never regretted. We certainly wish you good luck in your career.

Bob and Listy have kept us fully informed on David's surgery and post operation condition. We reproduce in part their comments, as follows.

In late June David experienced an arrhythmia, which lasted 2-3 minutes. That told us it was time to do something. We visited Kaiser, and they referred us to the cardiology department at UCSD. After reviewing David's medical history and warning us of future heart abnormalities, they advised us to proceed with the surgery. The whole process was done with catheters, first to identify

the suspected extra conductive tissue, next to induce an arrhythmia to confirm it's location, then to see if there were any other electrical issues, and finally to "scar" the conductor so electrical impulses can no longer bridge the atria and ventricles. Finally, they tried to induce an abnormal beat once again, and because they couldn't, they knew it was successful. As it turns out, the surgeon is a brand new Francis Parker parent, Dr. Ulrika Birgensdoter-Green (introduced with a heavy Swedish accent).

David was very upbeat about the process, we are very proud of how he conducted himself, and we are thrilled to have him come home again as a perfect kid. Listy and Bob
