


### **Kevin graduates from SDSU**

Unfortunately, we will not be coming to Easter. We have to be at a conference on Monday morning so we are flying on Easter day. But we do have some news. Hopefully Megan will be sending you a note but incase she doesn't.

Megan has been invited to be a lifetime member of the National Society of Collegiate Scholars which is based on outstanding achievement during the first two years of transition to college. It is a service organization that combines high scholarship with a commitment to help others.

Megan also has a new job for next year. She will be tutoring Chemistry students. She is in top 10% of her class of hundreds but to be a tutor, she had to create a lesson plan and go through a very competitive interview process. She just learned that she has been selected for this position. So she follows in the long line of Riel teachers.

Michael also has been in the news but only his work, not his name. Michael is working on his major in bioinformatics and is working with the genone project data. As part of his work, he has helped locate a common mutation in the DNA structure of people who suffer from schizophrenia and other bipolar disorders -- an inversion of a large part of the DNA sequence on chromosome eight. The professor that he is working with Roel Ophoff, an assistant professor at UCLA, was featured recently for this work and which earned Dr.Ophoff a research grant to continue his work. While Dr. Ophoff mentioned Michael's contribution in the interview for the article, the article on the front page of the UCLA news did not, unfortunately, include Michael's name. But he has the satisfaction of knowing that he is a part of the discovery that may lead to breakthroughs in understanding the genetic causes of neurological disorders. And of course, he is only just beginning in a field where his years of computer experience in solving problems in games will now be applied solving biological riddles.

Friday evening, we went to the Spanish steps and wandered around that area, we also saw the Trevi fountain. What an incredible sculpture! That was my favorite thing to see in Rome. The sculptor, Bernini, has such an incredible way of making the marble and stone come alive. We saw a lot of his work, along with Michelangelo's and it was so amazing. I love seeing the clothing in the statues because it really looks as if the rock is flowing and moving. In Rome, every time you turn the corner there is another amazing fountain, or a group of statues or a huge significant building, or all of the above! There is so much in that city it is overwhelming. Anyway, we also saw the Vatican and the Vatican museum. Both were incredible. As if the Sistine Chapel is not enough, there are a ton of amazing pieces of art in the museum. I took an ancient Mediterranean art history class at Santa Cruz and it could have been completely out of this museum. (There were great exhibits on all of the four cultures we studied; Mesopotamian, Egyptian, Greek and Roman) Unfortunately, the Raphael rooms were closed, so I will have to visit them another time.
