Living Trust update






A Genome-Wide Survey of Segmental Duplications That Mediate Common Human Genetic Variation of Chromosomal Architecture

His results were presented in the form of a poster session. free to visit with Michael and discuss his results. The conference lasted for three days, and included formal presentations commercial exhibits, as well as the poster sessions. Michael's results also have been prepared as a formal technical paper, which has submitted been for publication.
