Recently we received the following letter from JJ telling us about his summer volunteer work with a church group. We congratulate JJ on spending some of his summer vacation helping those who need help.

This summer I will be joining a team of youth and adults from my church, Ascension Catholic Parish, who have set aside a week of their time to help needy children and families in other communities. We will be joining other participants from across the country in a program called *Young Neighbors In Action*.

My team will consist of 20 youth and 4 adults, have volunteered to work in Gallup, New Mexico. We will be helping that community during the last week of June into the first week of July.

I am responsible for raising funds for my expenses for this week of charitable work, that is why I am writing to you, to see if you would help support me to raise the funds I need for this project. Your donation will be greatly appreciated.

For last year's YNIA trip, we went to Texas. Here is how it works. Months before the trip we know what state we are going to but we do not know what we are going to do in that state. We do not figure out until the night before we leave. Last year in San Antonio, Texas, I got to help the mentally challenged at Mission Hills facility. I learned that they are not so much different from us. Most of them can still play and read and talk, they just have social problems when it comes to talking to us. This information helped me understand them better and taught me more. This was a great experience for me and that is why I am hoping you will help me go this year.



Grandpa and Grandma both sick

After lunch at the Easter day celebration Grandma suddenly became violently sick, and had to be helped to the car and taken home. She was cared for by her daughters, especially Margaret, who came home to help get her into bed. Fortunately, by nightfall she was somewhat improved and later on got a good nights sleep. It is not clear what caused the problem. Perhaps the chicken dish she ate during lunch was not fresh, and also she soon afterwards developed a severe cold. Grandpa also caught the cold, and both were fairly sick. We finally (on the following Sunday) both checked in at the urgent care facility and were prescribed medication which helped out, and we both felt better at the end of the following Sunday. We were told later by Listy that husband Bob, who helped get Grandma to the care at Easter was also sick during that night. We understand he has recovered nicely.

In addition to all of the above health problems, the wrist Grandma injured during the fall she experienced last month has not really improved very much. She visited her back surgeon once again, and he suggested she discard the removable brace she had been wearing and replace it with a more conventional cast. After two weeks the cast was removed and her wrist was x-rayed once again. Like all of the various prior x-rays, the doctor could find no fractures of any kind. However, her wrist is still quite tender, and the doctor has recommended physical therapy. No schedule has been established so far, but she hopes to begin very soon. Hence, April was not a very pleasant month, but we are hoping for some improvement in the near future.

Bob Gillingham's father, Dave, has heart attack

We learned recently from Listy that Dave experienced a heart attack when he and his wife, Martha, were away from their home in Palm Springs. He was hospitalized briefly, and now has a pacemaker. We understand he is OK now, and back at home. Martha also is not well, and is experiencing painful back problems which have put her in a wheelchair. We certainly hope that both are doing better, and send our best wishes from our entire family.

Ed Riel was also sick recently

In March and April, Ed was quit sick for several weeks. He told us that he acquired a cold which seemed to get a little better but then return. Finally, after suffering for several weeks he called his doctor and told him that he needed some help. After describing his symptoms the doctor prescribed some medication. That solved the problem, and he made a rapid recovery.


Kristy wins scholarship award
