
JJ confirmed in Catholic church

AMSTERDAM

Bud and Margaret celebrated there 30 years of marriage by taking two very different trips. The first was to The Netherlands. Margaret had a speaking engagement in Enschede, a small city in the south east (very close to the border with Germany). But before going to Enschede, Margaret and Bud spent four days as tourists in Amsterdam. Amsterdam is below sea level and there are canals throughout the city which are lit up with small lights at night reflecting



off the water. It is flat and bikes were everywhere. The "bike park" at the train station, had four levels for parking bikes. It was the size of any car park but the slots were all of bikes. Kids, teenagers, adults. some in professional clothes, and old people all moved around the city in bikes. Parents expertly balanced babies, kids,

and packages on bikes and young adults even held hands while riding. You had to watch carefully to stay out of bike lanes and not be hit by bike traffic.

The city has an "I Amsterdam" tourist plan where many of the museums entrances and access to all of the public transport, and a boat ride on the canal was included for a daily rate. With multi-day passes, it seemed to Bud that Margaret was intent on mapping a path through the city that got them to visit every museum on the list. (Truth is they only saw a small faction of the 50 museums.) Margaret's favorite was the Van Gogh Museum and the The Rijksmuseum. (When Grandpa and Grandma were in Amsterdam a few years ago we also were very impressed by the Rijksmuseum. If any of you are ever in Amsterdam, be sure and allow a day to enjoy its contents.)
