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

George Spindler Award For Career Achievement

2006 recipient of the George Spindler Award for career excellence, Bud Mehan has an outstanding record of teaching, research and service. He has published 11 books or edited collections, and more than 80 scholarly articles, book chapters or occasional papers. He has received multiple teaching awards, twenty grants fellowships, and has served on a dozen educational research

journal review boards. From 1990-1994, he served as Vice-President and then President of the Council on Anthropology and Education. Beyond the traditional markers of excellence, however, what most impressed the Committee was that even as he has earned his standing as an internationally known and respected scholar, he has been firmly grounded in the life and work of local communities and schools. Since 1999 he has served as the director of CREATE, The Center for Research on Educational Equity, Assessment, and Teaching Excellence. Under his direction, CREATE has formed collaborations between the University of California-San Diego and local elementary and secondary schools, conducted impact-oriented research on improving educational opportunities for underserved students, and offered teacher education and professional development. Most impressively, under Mehan's direction, CREATE has opened and shepherds the highly successful Preuss School, a 700 student school that serves students, grades 6-12, who will be the first of their families to attend college. The Spindler award recognizes achievement as a researcher or practitioner. In Bud Mehan's case, he successfully brings together research, practice and program building to 1) add new knowledge to the field of educational anthropology, 2) concretely affect the practices of teachers, 3) add to the intellectual resources available to local communities and schools, and most importantly, 4) positively impact the academic lives of individual students. To wit, we can think of no better recipient for the 2006 award then Bud Mehan.

The award was presented at the annual meeting of the American Anthropology Association, which took place recently in San Jose. The above article was written by Margaret, based on the award presentation address. We certainly congratulate Bud on this important award in further recognition of his many contributions to the field of educational anthropology.


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

So remember I do love you and wished that you lived near: But now it's time to post this and say "good bye, my dear".


At last I'm by the post box and my face has sure gone red: Instead of posting this to you, I've opened it instead.
