


Some Fathers Day family celebrations

Bud takes Margaret to The Old Country Bud was invited to Dublin, Ireland in July to give the keynote address at a conference on schooling as a way out of poverty. The conference was attended by the Minister of Education, local and regional educators, and political activists. After the conference, they explored Dublin, (London)derry, and Belfast with a long time friend, Jim Skelly.

Highlights of the Dublin visit included tours of the Viking Museum, Christ Church Cathedral, St Patrick's Cathedral, Trinity College of the University of Dublin, and the jail that housed the leaders of the 1916 "rising" against authoritarian British rule. Trinity College is famous for housing the Book of Kells, one of the oldest illuminated religious texts and the Long Room—a building as long as a football field and holding early Christian and Medieval texts.

Jim showed Bud and Margaret the splendor of "the emerald isle" at its most northern point as well as the vestiges of "the troubles" in (London)derry and Belfast. [The Catholics call the city Derry—to distinguish it from the British label—Londonderry]. Although the wars between Protestants and Catholics are officially over, vestiges can be seen just below the surface in Northern Ireland. Streets in working class neighborhoods are divided by 12 foot concrete and steel fences—to separate Catholic and Protestant. Twenty foot high posters adorn buildings-shouting support for one side or the other. All concerned see hope in the younger generation who attend school together and begin to intermarry.

A refreshing note: The Irish are enthralled by Barack Obama's candidacy—seeing hope for a less bellicose and more engaged presidency; and, they have discovered his Irish roots. His name there is: O'Bama
