

are saddened by it. I only learned she was sick this past January when I wrote Gerald to see if he could give me her address. I am glad that we did share a short round of messages in the last month. I have been reading Maria's book, Madam de Stael and I am so sad I will not be able to talk with her about it. What a compelling biography of this very powerful figure in French history. The detail and skill with which Maria brings these women back to life is amazing. I wish I had more time to share my reflections with her. My own memories are of a wonderful time when both of you welcomed me-- both family and stranger-- into your home. I look back now and worry that at 21 I might not have been aware enough of all of the things one should do to be a good guest. I hope that I expressed how wonderful it was for me to get to know you and to spend time with your young family. It was so important to me to get to know my mother's family and now I share with you this sad loss. As the family gathers, please share our love with everyone. 
