#### **Wedding Photography**

Photography dates back to the early 1800s. We all have seen Civil War pictures and early sports photos taken by professionals, who used elaborate equipment. Film sensitivity to light was marginal, and early picture takers used magnesium powder sprinkled on a metal tray and ignited to produce the brilliant flash needed in dim or no natural light. The early pictures were recorded on glass plates coated with the light sensitive chemical emulsions. These complications pretty much limited photography to professionals. All that changed, however, when George Eastman developed plastic film to replace the glass plate. This opened the door to private citizens as amateur photographers, and before long cameras became common household items. In 1930 the Eastmen Kodak Company conceived one of the cleverest advertising schemes. Every 12 year old child whose birthday was in 1930 (30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Company) was offered a free Kodak Brownie camera. Thus, Grandpa acquired his first camera, and soon thereafter he set up a dark room in a closet and acquired the necessary chemicals to develop and print his own pictures. Most people, however, sent their own films out to a commercial supplier, and photography became big business. All this changed with the advent of the digital camera. Once you buy one, and assuming you already own a computer and a printer you now have the ability to produce as many pictures as you wish.

At the wedding, digital cameras were everywhere with Birdy taking 900 pictures, Francie took 500, and Grandpa only about 40 pictures. Of course, Carol, Margaret, Listy and others including from Miguel's family were also snapping pictures. This was all in addition to the professional photographer; hence one might conclude the event was recorded by at many thousands of pictures. Of course, the totals can be reviewed and the bad ones culled out. While Grandma was too tired and cold to stay for dinner, we use pictures that Francie kindly provided to tell the dinner story.
