




Listy Gillingham Celebrated as Nominee for San Diego Magazine's Woman of the Year

The same kind of single-minded determination that brought my wife back to her mind-bogglingly long races helped our school endure for 100 years through the Great Depression, several wars, near-closure, and any number of other challenges. The same kind of perseverance that finds Listy on the trails every morning at 5:00 a.m. has marked our most successful students for a century. And, the collaborative, collegial spirit that has been the foundation of her informal, makeshift running club for the last 25 years is the same secret ingredient that has sustained our school and can be seen every day, but especially this last week as parents pitched in in countless ways including dressing fairy tale forest characters, portraying colonial figures, decorating our courtyard for Language and Culture Week and showing up all over the county to volunteer their help.

I'll never understand how Listy can bounce out of bed every day before the crack of dawn nor how she convinces others to join her, but like the school that has been my home for more years than it hasn't, I know when I've picked a winner.

Merica Family's History Discussed at Mehan's Dinner Party

Margaret and Bud hosted a dinner for Cousin Michael Merica, his wife Linda, Grandma Yaya, Karla and I at their home in Encinitas a few weeks ago. It was a chance for me to get to know Michael and Linda and hear some of the stories they knew about the Merica family.

As Michael tells us Grandma Edith is the last person in the Merica Family to be 100% Spartan. Yes it's true that both her parents can be traced back to Greek Spartans living in what was called Constantinople in the mid 1400's. She is the last of her Generation as all of her siblings have now passed away and all of them married spouses that were not of Spartan blood. However that makes me and the rest of my sisters and brothers ½ Spartan which may explain why we were all so competitive when we were growing up.

Michael also told us the story of how my grandfather Theodore Merica (Edith's Father) made his first fortune. As the story goes while living on one of the islands in the south of Greece he got the idea to salvage barges that had sunk in the shallow waters nearby. The only problem was how to get them from being sunk to where they would float again, float being the operative word here. So he got an idea to use the stomachs of oxen to create floats that could be tied onto the barge and eventually, with enough of them attached, return it to the surface. Once on the surface the barge could be repaired and then used to haul cargo across the Mediterranean Sea.

OK one problem solved but it created another one; how to get the floats down to the barge and then inflate them? He invented a valve that could be attached to the stomach which could be opened and closed thus allowing the stomach to be inflated underwater. Next he hired local sponge divers who were known for their ability to dive deep and hold their breath for long periods of time. He instructed them to dive down, attach the floats, then inflate them by making several trips from the surface down to the float, opening the valve, exhaling into the float, then returning to the surface. By repeating this process he

was able to salvage, and put back into use barges at a fraction of the cost for new ones.

Because he did not have to expend large sums of money buying new barges, he was able to haul freight for half the cost of his competitors. Thus allowing him to gain new customers and still maintain a high profit margin. His business flourished and he continued to add to his fleet amassing more the 20 ships and barges before he moved on to other ventures.

Eventually he moved to Turkey and set up a very successful mercantile business and started a family of his own. However he also found himself on the wrong end of the local government (if you could call it that) and the entire Merica family was on the verge of being killed; until the US Army moved in to save them. But that's a story for another time. Of course you could always invite Michael and Linda to dinner if you want to hear it sooner.

Michael has a wealth of knowledge when it comes to the Merica family history and he has just finished translating a Greek book called GREEKS IN MODERN IRAN, by EVANGELLOS VENETIS that documents some of the Mercia's family history in Iran. I strongly encourage everyone to spend some time with Michael and Linda as they are a really charming couple and Linda's Greek bread is too die for! Also Michael owns his own Farmers insurance agency so if you need any insurance you know whom to go to.

We all had a great time and I thank Margaret and Bud for the hospitality they showed us even after I tore the bumper off of Bud's Mini Cooper while parking in their driveway. Fortunately for me, Bud was able to buy the parts and repair it himself and saved me a lot of money. 


Grandma's Brag Sheet


