The day after Pearl Harbor was bombed, President Roosevelt appeared before a joint session of Congress and declared, "Yesterday, December 7, 1941--a date which will live in infamy--the United States of America was suddenly and deliberately attacked by naval and air forces of the Empire of Japan." The museum had several of the aircraft used during that attack. It was a very interesting and complete collection.



On the next day we met up with Cindy and Boone in Kauai and headed over to the Waiohai in Poipu Beach to our timeshare. We spent a lovely week hanging out in the sun, the sand and the surf with some sea lions and turtles. We even did a little snorkeling in the rain which worried me since I didn't want my hair to get wet, hahahah.

We visited the lighthouse home to many wedge tail shearwaters, (birds to you) and hung out with a couple of nenes, or the Hawaiian Goose, their state bird. Today, the mission of this not-for-profit organization continues to be multifaceted, strengthening the firm foundation upon which the gardens were conceived.

The collection contains a beautiful home and swimming pool surrounded by lush gardens and many rainbow eucalyptus trees. If you've never seen one they are very distinctive. When the bark peels off it reveals many beautiful colors underneath. The many bronze and copper sculptures were collected or commissioned by Joyce over many years and reflect many different themes throughout the gardens, even showing a couple of the gardeners having some spam a staple not only of Hawaii, but was often found in the Riel refrigerator on Lyndon Road . 
the hunter, provider and protector for us all. That is how I like to remember my dad most!

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### Runny Nose Update November 2014

Well it has been 3 or 4 months since the last update so I thought it was about that time. Some of you seem to be a bit timid in asking how things are going so I'm happy to put it out there. I don't get weird about any of this stuff, I have no secrets and as far as I'm concerned, it is all simply a matter of fact.

My new rheumatologist is working out well. We agree on a treatment plan with regard to the corticosteroid use which is huge. My previous

doc insisted on getting me below 20mg daily to slow the debilitating side effects of the medication. I have complained for years that 20mg is too low and has resulted in a rollercoaster ride of disease flare and high dose meds to rein in control. My new doc agrees that 30mg daily is a better threshold and so far is keeping the flares under better control. The long term damage from the meds need to be balanced against the long term damage from the disease but for now it appears that net-net I am using less cortisone at 30mg than I was at 20mg since I don't have to go for weeks at a time at 100mg to regain control of a flare. I'm just happy to finally have a doctor that sees this and is willing to listen to me!

Edema (fluid retention) is a big part of my daily life. The muscle disease, heart failure and many of the medications I take all contribute to the fluid imbalance. I take a host of meds including diuretics to help control the edema but it still gets ahead of me at times especially when the disease runs amuck and requires a hospital stay to get it all back in balance. The first week of November started all wrong for me. The edema in my left leg got so bad the fluid just wanted out! I started developing blisters on my lower leg as the fluid pushed its way to the surface. That allowed a path in for bacteria and resulted in cellulitis, a skin infection. For most people that would not be a big deal but because I am immunocompromised it turned into a bigger deal. At the time I thought it was another blood clot so I called urgent care. They insisted I go to the ER and with Birdy already on that path I decided this was not an argument I was going to win. So, on Sunday evening we went to the emergency room at Kaiser.

They quickly determined I had an infection and began IV antibiotics. The problem was that it had already gone septic (systemic blood infection). Kaiser was out of beds so at 2:00AM they put me in an ambulance and shipped me off to Scripps/Mercy in Mission Hills. The first few days were challenging because the fluid retention was a bit out of control despite around the clock IV diuretics. The infection was winning so heart failure and renal failure were a problem since we couldn't get the fluid off. Finally the high dose antibiotics started to turn the tide on the infection which allowed the diuretics to start working. After peeing out 20+ lbs in two days I started feeling a lot better. Finally after a week of hanging out at "the spa" things were under enough control that they let me go home. I wish I could say this sort of thing was avoidable but it is just part of the ride. Opportunistic infection is just something I have to live with or in fear of...so don't cough around me please! Pain is challenging me at times. Specifically my neck and especially bad is the low back pain from failed back surgeries (post laminectomy syndrome) the medical term for "oops we screwed up." I have been using dilaudid to control the pain on the bad days but now I am using methadone regularly and diluadid for breakthrough pain. This seems to be working and I find it easier to work while on methadone without feeling quite as stupid. Go figure, its synthetic heroin but it works pretty well for managing chronic pain while making me less sleepy and no weird dreams. It has my sleep habits all screwed up but in time that should settle down.

All in all, and aside from the occasional bumps in the road that require a little help from the hospital, I would say I'm doing pretty well! I look around the room every month when I'm in getting my five day infusions and think to myself I'm pretty lucky. Some of the folks I'm with have it a lot tougher than me. I'm still able to work and able to walk unlike some of those poor bastards! I like to sit near the whiners and complainers that get wheeled in since they complain about everything which makes my world look a little brighter. If I engage them in conversation some will go on for hours about how awful they have it and how bad their life is... Am I twisted or what?
