

I have had a lot of updates lately so I'm putting them together in one Riel Family press release. As many of you know, I have moved to Seattle, because my mentor, Graham Johnson got a job as a director at the Allen Institute for Cell Science. I have been up here about a year, but I've technically still been employed through UCSF because I had an ongoing grant. As of this coming Monday, I'll be a full-time employee of the Allen Institute as a Visualization Scientist. I am very excited about this position and this project. We just released our website yesterday and have been getting some good coverage http://www.nature.com/news/machine-learning-predicts-the-look-of-stem-cells-1.21769. I've worked on the 3D Cell Viewer, which is a way that anyone can view and interact with all the microscopy data, and I built the Cell Catalog, which is where other scientists can view the data of each cell line and order their own. The other fun part of this is HR only has a few different categories for job types, which are 'Scientist' for people doing lab work, 'Computer Scientist' for the software engineers, and 'Bio-informatician', which is what I am now, more or less by process of elimination. The reason this is fun is that my brother's PhD is in Bio Informatics. So, with my unusual combination of skills and interests I've accidentally just wandered into his career track.





SHOW UP * SPEAK OUT

Another bit of news is we've submitted a research paper for review. This is work I've done at UCSF as my postdoc, in collaboration with Lil Fritz-Laylin, who is a fantastic researcher. I'm really proud of this work. And the great part of it is even if you don't follow the science, the data itself is inherently beautiful. This work is all about studying how white blood cells move. Up until very recently it was only possible to watch cells crawl on flat surfaces, but there are no flat surfaces in your body. And white blood cells move quite fast in comparison to other cell types. This data is of cells crawling on networks of collagen (basically a jungle gym Lil synthesized for the cells), and the images were collected using the microscopy that won Eric Betzig the Nobel prize for developing it. This made it so we can watch these cells move in a much more natural environment with a level of detail never seen before. My contribution to this work was finding new ways to visualize and analyze the data since there were no established tools for doing so. We were able to identify new structure types the cells form to move, and come up with a new hypothesis for how the cells are propelling themselves.

Lastly, I've been volunteering as lead developer for the Town Hall Project. The group is a collection of very diligent volunteers who contact members of congress to find when they're holding events. It's crazy that there was no collection like this before they started, but when they began they were just collecting the information in a google doc. It got so popular so quickly that it was overwhelming the functionality of the google doc. I reached out to Nathan Williams, one of the founds of the project and offered to build a website, and the result is townhallproject.com, which I'm building in collaboration with other volunteer coders. I'm also working on replacing the data collection and management process so the database is more uniform, and easier to share with other progressive organizations. It's a super fun project to work on intellectually, and I've also been learning about good management. In academia, I think we often neglect some of these very critical skills, like motiving group members, keeping deadlines, etc. because we are a bunch of easily distracted day-dreamers (I may be exaggerating slightly). The people on this project have shown me a lot about how to be an effective leader and organizer, and I hope to absorb some of those skills while I am able to contribute my particular skills to the project. They are also sending me to a meeting in LA this month with other progressive coding group, I'm really looking forward to that.



After talking about it for years we're finally doing it - Ashley and I are packing up the family including Chico the cat, and moving back to San Diego! We always knew it was something we wanted to do eventually but we didn't think it was going to happen this suddenly.

A few months ago, the CEO of my company stepped down and the new CEO started taking the company in a new direction, away from the research and development work that my group does. There were some troubling signs early on, but the last straw for me was when the new CEO shut down our satellite office. I work for a company in Boston but I've built a small data science group in Colorado. My team and I rent an office in one of those shared office spaces, and the powers-that-be decided that they didn't want to pay for that extravagance any more. When I first started with this company I worked from home for a year and I really didn't want to do it again. Working in your pajamas all day is nice for a little while, but it got pretty lonely and Ashley was complaining that I had stopped showering.

I didn't want to go back to that, so I started looking for work, mostly in San Diego. My top choice was to work at Illumina, and I was really happy to find that they had a job posting that looked like a perfect fit. It is a senior



bioinformatics scientist position working on improving a non-invasive prenatal genetic screening test (early detection of conditions like down-syndrome in babies before they are born). I applied and heard back from them pretty quickly. The interview process was intense. I had a technical interview, then an interview with the recruiter, then a six-problem homework assignment that they gave me on a Tuesday and was due on a Friday. The amount of work they asked for would have been hard under normal circumstances, but Addy was just two weeks old, so I didn't have a ton of spare time on my hands.



After a grueling three days, I turned in a pretty polished assignment and made it to the video interview. After that was the on-site interview a few weeks ago. The interview went really well. I really liked the group and felt that I had a decent shot at getting the job. A week later they reached out and said they would like to make me an offer. I was overjoyed! The only catch was that I had to start within a month because they had an urgent project they wanted me to get started on.



Since then our life has been insanely busy. I've been trying to wrap things up with my current job, Ashley is getting

her resume ready for teaching jobs in SD, we've been getting our house ready to sell (it went on the market yesterday, people start coming tomorrow), we are organizing a move, looking for a new house, all while juggling a toddler and a newborn. Needless to say, we're completely exhausted.

To keep us going, Ashley and I keep talking about how excited we are to be moving home and be closer to all of you. It's hard to believe that two months ago we were living our lives as we normally did, and now I have a new job, we're selling the only house we've ever lived in, and we'll be living in San Diego in one week. It blows my mind. We're so exciting to be coming home and can't wait to see a lot more of all

of you!

As you can see that damn protein (normal 6.3) ruined my perfect all black score. The alk phos reading was especially exciting because:

An alkaline phosphatase level test (ALP test) measures the amount of alkaline phosphatase enzyme in your blood-stream. The test requires a simple blood draw and is often a routine part of other blood tests.

Abnormal levels of ALP in your blood most often indicate a problem with your liver, gall bladder, or bones, and God knows I don't need any of those things but it certainly is encouraging to think that the indication is that my bones are getting stronger! Normal is 38 to 126 and as you can see from past tests in the red I have definitely been improving!!!

But check this one out, I am in the black for white blood cells, the ones we killed off in the hospital back in December through January. My stem cells

are grafting nicely and my numbers are great!!!!!! Normal range for red blood cells is 4.0, so I am very close to that. Hemoglobin and hemotacrit (we check these two for anemia), normal range 12 and 36, again pretty damn close, and as you can see, have been climbing steadily since the transplant. My platelets are just 9 short of the bottom end of normal, so I will probably not bleed out anytime soon, hahah.


My neutrophils, though not shown above are also behaving as they should, hence the pictures on facebook minus the mask. Speaking of the mask, I had a great time at two of Brett's film festivals and am considering heading up to LA again for a third one in NoHo (North Hollywood for all of you that are not hip to the slang for smaller communities in bigger cities) a week from Wednesday.

If you follow our family Newsletter, put out monthly by my amazing brother, Bob Riel, you will not only get to see Brett's writeup about his event and new home but also there is a link to Bryce's spectacular win in the inaugural soccer specific photo scavenger hunt that he won as a great fan of the New York City FC. (Football Club for you non soccer fans!)

This last Thursday, I got to have another bone marrow biopsy, oh joy wasn't that something to look forward to!!! The results will not come back till early next week but it was mainly more of a baseline test to show me that all the chemo they pumped into me in December and January had a purpose.

Dr. Hutchins told me that the bone she had to go through to get to the marrow seemed a little less "squishy" which I am sure is a highly technical term for judging the density of your bones, hahaha. Hopefully they are getting stronger and less full of holes as they were at the end of last year.

To all of Lyle's and my friends in the AFSA I am contemplating coming out to New Orleans next month for the meetings. (Ok Dr. Hutchins, don't freak out...), it will depend on whether I have to have any treatments that might interfere. I already have to get into the hospital every 4 days to have my Central venous catheter flushed out with Heparin so that I do not get a blood clot. Isn't that an at-



tractive accessory!!!

No more big news for now, still waiting to do the Allogeneic transplant, testing my son Brett to see if he is a likely candidate. Until that time I will probably start taking an oral chemo every week to discourage any mutating going on. I certainly do not want any teenage mutant ninja turtles showing up!!!


If there is any earth shattering news from the Biopsy I will send out a quick paragraph or 2 early next week.



Just a quick side bar for everyone, got the results back from my bone marrow biopsy and of the 2 samples Dr. Hutchins took, there was no Myeloma present. That is certainly something to cheer about!!! At least all of the effort of my Doctors and Nurses was not in vain!

Now that doesn't mean it won't come back given the fact that I still have that mutating gene that wants to spit out cancer cells left and right, but I am winning the war today and that is good.

I am starting back on an oral chemo today, Cytoxan to be specific also known as Cyclophasamide. It is the pill form of what I got in the hospital both times last December. This one will not be as strong, I will take it once a week with a steroid.

I still have a little bit of bone pain from all the holes that are still there, but it is not a terrible thing. I can tolerate it. Multiple Myeloma bone pain:


"Bone pain affects almost 70% of patients and is the most common symptom.[11] Myeloma bone pain usually involves the spine and ribs, and worsens with activity."
