Sometimes, Texting is NOT Okay!

Ok, so forget the fact that I rarely check my texts during work hours (even though this time I looked at it within about 20 minutes) but as I read the text, I started off into immediate panic mode... "nauseous and I'm having pain"... Oh God is it Covid??? ... "I'm having pain all the way through my chest" ... God no, it's worse, a heart attack! Then I read on "I think it may be gall-stones or my gallbladder. I don't think it's my heart. I'll let you know." Oh, good! She'll let me know if she is having a heart attack!

No. No. No. This is not a textable moment! Keep in mind that I didn't see her text right away, so she had time to send the next text as well. "The doctor is going to check for cardiac enzyme, if the test is negative, he will let me drive myself to Sharp Memorial. But he is sending me there no mater what. So, I'll be in your neck of the woods in a while" ... Oh great! Why not just have the ambulance drop by my office for a quick visit on your way in...

As it turned out I was able to reach Karla by phone after I recovered from reading the above texts. She sounded fine and I told her I was on my way to the urgent care office. Unfortunately, she explained because of Covid I would not be allowed in to see her. So, I waited in the car for

word on her tests. The doctor still was not convinced that she wasn't having a heart attack because her enzyme levels came back as "high normal." Just what in the heck is "High Normal?" Regardless, the doctor wanted Karla to take an ambulance ride to the hospital just to be safe.

Karla on the other hand, who is probably a better diagnostician than the doctor when it comes to her own body, insisted that it was just gall stones and since I was right outside, she could get to the hospital faster rather than waiting for an ambulance. After what seemed like hours, the Doctor finally agreed to let Karla go with me.

Some might ask why not just go to Grossmont hospital since it is right there in the same complex? The problem is that Grossmont is the only hospital serving the entire east county and as such is always packed. Emergency room wait times are commonly in the 4 – 6 hour range. On the other hand, Sharp Memorial is surrounded by 3 other major hospitals and most times you can get in with under an hour wait.

So off we go, with Karla in a lot of pain but normal blood pressure and a normal heart rate. Still I'm not exactly driving slow either. We both knew that I would not be able to go into the hospital with her and most likely not be allowed to visit either. So, we made sure she had her phone and iPad along with chargers so we could still communicate.

Driving up to the emergency room was a little strange. They had a nurse outside directing traffic and checking people in. Since Karla had already been pre-screened for Covid they took her right in and told me I could go now... Thank you! I can go now! And no, you can't go in nor will you be allowed to visit! Don't get me wrong the nurse was very sympathetic and nice but these are the times we live in now. So off I drive not knowing exactly what was wrong with her. By now it's 4:30 in the afternoon and I figure I should get a call by the time I get home.

Wrong! I get home and try to call Karla, but it goes direct to voicemail like the phone has been shut off. 5:30 goes by and still no word, 6:30 and still no communication and by 7:00 I am getting really worried. I decide to call the emergency room to see if I can get an update. I finally get through to someone who asks me a couple of security questions to make sure I am really who I say I am. Then after passing all of her tests she tells me that Karla is getting a Cat Scan and won't be back for a while. I ask if there is any word on what was wrong and she tells me "I can't tell you because she need permission from Karla before she can discuss her condition!" Call me silly but don't you think they would have asked her that when I dropped her off? I mean it's not like they were supper busy, in fact, we were about the only ones there.

I somewhat protested and the nurse was nice enough to tell me that it most likely was a gall-bladder issue, but they weren't sure yet. She said she would get permission from Karla and also show her how to make her phone work with their Wi-Fi so she could call me. Later, Karla sent me a text telling me she had gall stones but was feeling better. Another text!!! I called her right away asking her why she didn't call. She said, "since there was no cell phone coverage in the ER she just used the next best thing." Let me digress for a moment, Karla is what some people might call "technically challenged" so it was no surprise when she asked, "how are you calling me when I couldn't call you?" Technically, I was facetiming her, but I let that slide. I

explained the wonders of internet calling and then got down to business. "Tell the nurse it's OK to talk with me about your condition!" She did and then updated me on what had gone on so far.

First off, they gave her good drugs, so the pain was gone, and she felt much better. Finally! Good news! After a full rundown on what they thought it might be she had to go because she had been admitted to the hospital, and it was time to go to her room. Then after she got settled in (meaning more good drugs) it would be off to LaLa land for the night.


The next day was spent getting lots of tests and finally they determined that she has 2 stone lodged in the bile duct and that her gallbladder which normally is the size of a 50-cent piece now was bigger than a tennis ball. In a nut shell, she needed 2 operations one to remove the stones and a second to remove the gall bladder. However, with her heart condition they wanted to run more tests to make sure her heart could take the stress of surgery. The first operation was to remove the stones but couldn't take place until after her Covid test came back negative. Also, since it was not an invasive procedure (just a couple of instruments down the throat) they decided to do it first, and then, assuming all went well, they would remove her Gallbladder the next day. The first surgery went fine and once again Karla went to LALA Land.

Sunday rolls around and her surgery keeps getting pushed back due to her heart doctor running more tests. Meanwhile Karla is a facetime guru now and we have solved the communications gap! Finally, they operate around 5:30 pm. The doctor was hoping to go in laparoscopically but after trying for a bit determined that he would just have to cut her open. So after about a two-hour surgery the doctor called me to say everything went fine and that Karla was going to sleep well

that night.


Karla was discharged from the hospital on Tuesday, so I picked her up around 11:00 am and took her home. Unfortunately, there was a mix-up on the pain medication prescription because when I went to pick it up, they had high blood pressure medicine instead! We didn't get her pain medication until 5:30 that night and as you might imagine she was in a lot of pain.

However, since then, things have been going well. She now has two new scars to add to her other ones and is healing up



nicely. Hopefully, she can go back to work by the end of the month. But for now, just a lot of rest and recuperation is in order. I am really glad she is back home and thankful that it was something that could be handled relatively fast (also that it didn't happen a few weeks earlier when we were out of town on vacation). As the saying goes and especially in these times "it could have been a lot worse!"


