





10:00 We went to sleep very excited knowing we were only 3 hours away from Disney World!

Day 9 Friday 8/20

8:00 Left Madison and headed toward Orlando

12:00 Drove around Disney World a few times before we could figure out how to get to our campsite. But the drive was filled with giggles from 3 very excited kids! The familiar shouts, "I see castle, rocky mountain...made me remember the nickel contest when we were little. We pulled into Fort Wilderness and got all checked in. We got our wristbands, a welcome kit and headed to our site. We got set up and went out exploring. Within the first 5 minutes we saw wild turkeys, deer, and many lizards with curly tails. We headed to the pool and the kids enjoyed a huge tunnel slide and made lots of friends. Then came the lightning...again, and they closed the pool. We decided to walk back instead of taking a shuttle. We walked in the pouring rain being glad that we did not have to get back on the road again for a week.

4:00 Jeff and Miguel arrive!!!





After Jessica, Carol and the Rios kids drove the width of the country in 8 days in Harvey the RV, they finally safely arrived on Friday, 8/20, at Fort Wilderness, the huge Disney World RV Park about 5 miles from the Magic Kingdom. Miguel and Jeff flew into the Orlando Airport that night and made their way to meet the rest of the gang at FW.

Over the next 7 very eventful days, we saw deer, wild turkeys, a slew of white Ibises, and a single ferocious alligator right near the pool. (Alright, the young alligator was about 15" long) And this was just in the RV Park. What we didn't find, despite hot and humid weather, and lots of standing water, pesky mosquitoes. I don't know how they do it, but Disney has a system to mitigate the little buggers, and it works! We went to 5 parks in 7 days, including Disney's Animal Kingdom on Saturday, the Magic Kingdom on Sunday, Hollywood Studios on Tuesday, Epcot on Wednesday, and back to the Magic Kingdom on Thursday. No mosquitoes.

While we got rain nearly every night, we avoided storms at all the parks except one, and that was close to leaving time. Miguel spent a few days getting the RV ready for the return trip to New Jersey, and making sure that Shelby, the wonder dog, was well taken care of. He did join us a couple of the days at the parks, and thoroughly enjoyed Disney's Epcot, as did we all. We also had great luck with lines and waiting times with only a couple of waits longer than 30 minutes, with many rides allowing the kids to get on a second and third time with no waiting. So, to review, no mosquitoes, little rain, and relatively short lines. The only downside was the oppressive heat (90+) and humidity most days, but we dealt with it, and loved the inside of air-conditioned rides and attractions and the fact that everyone was masked up once inside any ride. Food was expensive and relatively unhealthy (lots of burgers and fries), but Miguel prepared sandwiches and dropped them off to us on several days, which helped.

We all had fans and refillable water bottles, but Disney World is very inconsistent with the availability of refill stations. They REALLY want you to buy the \$4.00 waters and sodas! Staying hydrated in the heat was a real challenge.

The best thing about Fort Wilderness is its large lake and the nice dock and shuttle craft we used to get to the main Disney World Park. It was a less than 15-minute boat ride, with very short wait times, nice views of many, many aquatic birds, and a drop off which was right at the front gate of the Magic Kingdom. Since we went to the main park on two of our days, and also used the boats to access the transfer to the Epcot monorail, it was quite convenient. Miguel even used the boats to deliver our lunches on a couple of occasions. An added plus is you could see and hear the nightly fireworks show from the edge of the lakefront. One thing that is NOT comforting are the many lakeside signs warning of snakes and alligators.

Here's a brief rundown of the rides and attractions that were rated most popular by our group at large: Please note that we developed a "barf rating system" for most of the fast or nausea-inducing rides. So, if something was deemed "high barf expectation", Grampy avoided, or at least complained about those rides the most. It was a sadistic pleasure that the kids got trying to get Grampy on the worst stomach-churners in each park.it

Disney's Animal Kingdom: Expedition Everest was a high-speed coaster similar to the Matterhorn at Disneyland. Since there is NO Matterhorn at Disney World, this is the closest thing. While the kids loved it, Grandpa found it somewhat high on the barf meter, but bravely went on this monster anyway. No harm, no foul.








Avatar, Flight of Passage was a 3-d flight simulator that, if you saw the movie Avatar, put you on the back of a banshee (flying dragon basically) for a stupendously exhilarating up and down flight along the coast of the Saturn moon Pandora. It was everyone's favorite ride, including old Barfy himself, in the whole park! Worth going on twice!





Ben and Grampy headed out to ride a bumpy tour bus through the savannah and plains of the Africa and Asia on the Kilimanjaro Safari, which includes REAL lions, gnus, giraffes, water buffalo, rhinos and much more. It was like a much smaller version of the Wild Animal Park Wgasa safari ride of yesteryear. But pretty neat, none-theless. We all got a little wet on the Kali River Rapids, and thoroughly enjoyed the Bird Show, and the Tree of Life attraction that is the center theme of the entire park. 4 thumbs up for our

first day's adventure!





Disney's Hollywood Studios: We got there right at opening to sprint to Slinky Dog Dash, a highly rated ride with usually long lines. We got on relatively quickly, but I'd say it was a fairly mild roller coaster that didn't bother the squeamish among us at all.

Among the rides that WERE avoided by the squeamish were the Rock n Roll Coaster and also the Twilight Zone Tower of Terror. Big favorites among the kids, Jessica and Grammly, some rode them more than once. The big attraction at this park is of course, Galaxy's Edge, Starwars Land. We had to make a reservation for the most popular ride in the park, Star Wars: Rise of the Resistance. But before our mid-afternoon time for that ride, we managed to ride Star Tours and the brand-new Millennium Falcon: Smugglers Run. Both a lot of fun for all, but the big feature of this section of the park is the Full-Sized replica, and very real looking, Millennium Falcon. We were all Star Wars nerds for most of the day, everyone wore their Star Wars Themed t-shirts, and we even had a small meal and drinks at Oga's Cantina, set up to look like the bar in Mos Eisley. \$\$\$\$





For those that haven't yet visited either of the Star Wars lands in Florida or Anaheim, we just have to relate a bit about Rise of the Resistance without spoiling it for the uninitiated. It was

the longest, most interactive, and fun experience you can have





in any amusement park. It's like 3 rides in one, and you really feel like you're caught in the middle of a battle between the First Order and the Resistance. If you've never seen the movie, shame on you:-) But let's just say this ride is well worth the wait and hassle of the appointment thing, (you jump on your devices at 7 AM to secure a spot) and was much more detailed and involved than we expected! And loved by all of us.

Epcot: For a park that we really didn't know too much about, Epcot was the biggest surprise! There was a couple of great things about Epcot that got everyone excited!

Much of Epcot is a huge lake which is surrounded by the "World Showcase". This is a series of small "towns" which represent countries around the world. There was an international food and wine festival featured at all the various national areas which largely sold small portions of food and drink from that country. So, for about \$5.00 you could get a "taster plate" of a food specific to that region. And most also had wines, beers or spirits for sale to compliment your "taster plate". We had a series of lunches and early dinners as we made our way around the lake. Some were better than others.


The Park also created a game for kids where they attempted to find a "hidden" figure of Remy, the rat, who starred in the 2007 animated film "Ratatouille". A 6" tall Remy figure was in 10 or 12 different locations in a variety of countries and their

little "villages". And Remy was always with a cooking implement, like a saltshaker, a spoon, a loaf of bread, etc. And he was generally on a roof, in a window, in a garden, etc. The kids had a work sheet with stickers which had to be transferred when they found Remy and the kitchen items. Rather than be bored by our wandering in shops and attractions, they had a game to perk their interest. Brilliant.

Epcot did have a series of rides which we also enjoyed, both in the Showcase area, and in the entrance plaza and its environs. The kids knew about Test Track, a ride which exceeded 60 MPH. It was very clever, whereby teams of 3 designed a car which could go fast, look very sporty and yet be fuel efficient. You then "raced" your car against others and received a score at the end. Great ride.


Other rides of note at Epcot were the Spaceship Earth which explored the evolution of technology over the years, and Mission: Space, an Astronaut training exercise. Now we had a couple of choices when entering this ride:





The green side was gentle and for all ages and ride tolerances. The ORANGE side had warnings that you might experience some discomfort. Grampy had some grave misgivings when talked into going on the ORANGE side with everyone else. Grampy's anxiety deepened when they strapped us into our own training module, and the barf bags appeared! (to use as necessary). So, we blasted off, and somehow, they spun us around and gave us the sensation that we had landed on Mars. The "barf meter" was off the charts as we wobbled off this ride. Kids loved it, however.

We also loved the "Soaring Around the World" where one went parasailing over many notable world sites such as the pyramids, the alps, the Eiffel Tower, Taj Mahal, Great Wall, Grand Canyon, and so forth. No nausea and no complaints after this visually stunning ride. What was neat about Epcot and made it different from many other parks, was that some of the rides exited through an interactive play and exploration area instead of a gift shop. Don't think they didn't have a million different shops in Epcot, but we appreciated these play and explore areas greatly, and the air conditioning they provided as well.





a very large (almost 6 million gallons) aquarium with real sharks, sea turtles, large sea bass, tunas and groupers, manatees, octopi, eels and other sea creatures of varying sizes and colors. Our day at Epcot ended with a fantastic Fireworks display, Epcot Forever, right over the lake in front of us.

Disney's Magic Kingdom: We spent 2 days at the Magic Kingdom, and it compared favorably to our own Disneyland in many ways. Our first objective was to "run" to the Seven Dwarves Mine Train which we were warned would have long lines later in the day. Needless to say, it was underwhelming to most of us. We did have more luck (and fun) on Big Thunder Mountain Railway, Pirates of the Caribbean, The Haunted House, Space Mountain, and Jungle Cruise.



But our big adventure was Splash Mountain, which is like the California ride of the same name, but a bit shorter. And after the big drop at the end of the ride, we circled around to the exit dock, only to stop about 100 feet short. And we waited, and waited, and waited. Until they announced the ride was broken and crews would assist us in exiting each boat. That wasn't a quick process in that people were also stuck at the top of the ride. Finally, after about 25 minutes of just sitting in our boat, they came with a tool that unlocked the safety lap bar and then helped each of us out of the boat, and thru the emergency exit. We were cautioned to not take any "backstage" pictures, but we did get to see the non-public area behind the ride. It's not so "magic" as the front of the rides, streets and promenades. They gave us a cold-water bottle and a fast pass for our inconvenience.



The second day we explored Tom Sawyer's Island, and



the fort which we remembered when we were kids, would fire onto the boats circling the island. They don't feature that part anymore, but the kids all loved shooting the canons and pretend guns out of the fort at the Thunder Mountain train ride and the island, we spent a lot of time there. Some of the rides getting second and 3rd visits because of the short lines were Space Mountain, Big Thunder Mountain, and Splash Mountain. We made sure to visit the Monsters Inc Laugh Floor, which is in a Tomorrowland theatre, and is an interactive com-

edy show featuring characters from the Monster's Inc franchise. We were allowed to submit jokes and riddles pre-show, and one of Sofia's was included in the show. Also, they would put a camera on various audience members, and ask them silly questions to stoke an audience response and laughter. Grampy was picked in one of these live streamed jokes and performed without too much humiliation.



Lastly, at about 8:45 PM, Main Street is filled with people wanting a good view of the Happily Ever After fireworks and light show. They projected lots of animated images onto the front of Sleeping Beauty's Castle, played loud themed music, and sent off nearly 700 explosive shells in a scintillating display that was very impressive. The last night, Jessica, Carol, and the kids got a close-up spot near the castle while Grampy caught the show from the deck of the just departing shuttle boat, it was totally awesome to see the show all the way back to the Fort Wilderness Dock.

On Friday AM, Carol and Jeff returned the rental car and flew home to San Diego. The Rios clan left Florida for New Jersey and arrived safely home in Edison 2 days later.

Jessica and Miguel returned to their Nursing and Firefighting, and the kids began the school year. And Shelby, the wonder dog, is undoubtedly happy to be home.
