

### OUR 3 WONDERFUL WEEKS IN NEW ZEALAND



Jeff and Carol hadn't seen their NZ family, Dustin, Lauren, Holden, Grayson, Lawson and Paxton, in nearly 3 years because of Covid. So it was with great excitement that we drove up to LAX in early August to board our Air New Zealand jumbo jet. Because of the Int'l Date Line, we slept thru August 5th, and landed in Auckland on the 6th. Dustin picked us up and we made our way North to the Benesch home in Snell's Beach, about an hour away.

We spent the first few days hanging out in Snells, getting to know our 4 rambunctious grandsons after our long absence. We celebrated Paxton's 4th birthday soon after our arrival and all the boys were more than happy to share his gifts, cake and toys! Dusty proved to be a great and reliable chef the entire trip and our meals with this group were always a joyous production. The

Snells Beach included day trips and hikes to nearby coastal communities and various bakeries, and a fantastic visit to a winery/sculpture garden where a moist fern forest and pastureland contained dozens of modern works of art of all sorts, some visually, and some auditory. Some bizarre shapes were head scratchers, but others were imaginative and awe inspiring. Quite the hike to say the least. We left for our first of 3 out-of-area trips soon thereafter, up to the beautiful Bay of Islands, about 3½ hours North. The historic area, the first landing spot for Captain Cook in New Zealand, is revered by the Maori peoples for its rich warrior and spiritual history. We spent a wonderful day at the Waitangi Treaty Grounds where we experienced a Maori ceremonial house with authentic Maori dancing, chanting, singing, weaponry and costumes and learned the history of the first interactions between the European explorers and the native peoples. We got to see long boats used by the warring factions of the Maori tribes and visited the museum and gift shops full of Maori jewelry, weavings, and carved stone.

We enjoyed a day on the water, as we all boarded a tour boat to look for local dolphins, but instead got a close-up view of the outer islands of this historic bay, including an ancient light house, a group of fur seals, and a huge stone arch which we almost motored through.

Another of the features of our Northern trip was a visit to Sheep World, a fun petting zoo, full of sheep, lambs, emus, calves, pigs and other farm animals where we got to accompany a staff member as she fed all the animals and told us the background of each. Of course, the boys were thrilled they got to feed various animals their milk, oats, hay or pellets.

On our drive back home to Snells Beach, we stopped at a cave inhabited by a New Zealand oddity, the glow worm. These very small invertebrates, weave small stringy webs, and then glow to attract small insects. Almost invisible to the naked eye, these "worms" glow by the thousands in the darkened cave. So many of them are glowing on the ceiling of the cave, that it looked like a clear desert sky full of stars.

After a couple of days to restock at home, we headed south for a longer, and very memorable trek to Coromandel and the hot sand beach. This beautiful peninsula is best known for its dynamic ocean views and for us, the volcanic activity that





causes scalding water to flow off the cliffs and onto the beach. The trick is to take your small spade and dig your own personal "hot tub" that mixes the cool ocean water with the steamy heated stuff. If you do it right, and we did, you can luxuriate in a perfectly made pool, and we enjoyed our hot spa even in the rain. We enjoyed homemade meals in our "bach on the beach". In New Zealand, vacation homes are called "Baches", and many of them are rentals when unoccupied by the owners. Our baches were all unique, but each had its own charms and luxuries. (And some were well "lived-in".)

Our next bach was located on the lake in a famous tourist area inland called Rotorua. This was a great, large, scenic home with a bonus: Ping pong, air hockey, and foosball tables in the garage, enjoyed by all. We had beautiful black swans in the back yard all the time, but until the last day, we also had rain and wind. That didn't keep us from enjoying many of Rotorua's best attractions. We went up a large lift to the top of a mountain, so we could ride luges down to the bottom, a great treat for our entire party. The luges were like go carts with no engines, but the wheels allowed the rider to really move down the various courses. We each got 5 rides down the hill, and there was considerable competition among us to see who was the fastest and most strategic to "win" the race down to the bottom. I would say that Dusty, Holden and Grayson definitely have the Benesch/Riel competitive gene, as there was some spirited jockeying to pass another rider.









We also visited a Redwood Forest, with huge trees, the tallest in New Zealand, that were imported decades ago as seedlings from California. The redwoods were outfitted with a series of stairs, platforms and bridges, so you walked several stories above the forest floor. from tree to tree and platform to platform. It was an awe-inspiring adventure. Most of the group also completed a longer hike through the redwoods, even though it drizzled throughout.

Another Rotorua attraction was a visit to Whakarewarewa Thermal preserve, where the highlights were geysers, stinky mud pools, and a group of Kiwis, rare birds that are normally only seen at night on preserves. But at this location, they had 3 young Kiwis, kept in a darkened enclosure, behind glass, and we all walked quietly and saw the birds running around among some native habitat. It was altogether an awesome experience. We visited another Maori cultural center that included a museum, an assembly hall, and the largest native art school in New Zealand. The school was amazing, and we got to see expert Maori stone and wood carvers, and weavers who created traditional clothing and decorations. The wood carving in particular was impressively detailed and large, with "totems" of spiritual and historic importance to Maori peoples.

Our last day in Rotorua was finally a clear, warm and dry day, and Lake Rotorua was inviting. We all went kayaking on the calm waters and spent much time with our slew of beautiful black swans. Carol, Lauren, and Holden took advantage of the clear skies and took a long 4 mile hike up Manngakkaramea, Rainbow Mountain Scenic Reserve, and though a bit muddy, enjoyed an amazing view of all the beautiful lakes, lush green hills and the volcano that created Lake Rerewhakaaitu. It was a tough hike up but the views on top made it all worthwhile!!

We drove home for a last couple of days in Snells Beach, celebrated Holden's 11th birthday with much fanfare, before our tearful goodbyes, and many fond memories. In fact, we enjoyed our time in New Zealand and our family so much, we're going back with Jason's family in November.
