Riel.Org Gets New Logo and New Look



As some of you may have noticed Riel.org has a new logo and an updated format. Additionally, there has been a lot more content added to the site. Back issues of the newsletter are now complete adding in from the first issue (April 1991) all the way up to the end of 2008. The site already had all issues from 2009 up to the present. Also added are Grandpa Frank Riel's military and genealogy records.

A New Look

I updated all of the pages to a new look with softer colors and more consistency. I also changed a few of the pictures used and added additional security features. The password to get in has not changed and you no longer need a user name. If you have forgotten the password, just shoot me an e-mail alpinebob57@ gmail.com and I will send it to you. Also, you will need an additional user name and password to access Granddad's military records. Use the same procedure (e-mail) to get access.



Frank Riel's Military Records

Grandpa was very good at keeping records and I have his whole file starting from his enlistment documents to his final discharge papers. He kept every order, note, receipt, list, letter, test, etc. he ever received or sent. There are a lot of interesting things to see, especially his test scores. I would have liked to have seen them when I was a kid, because he was giving me a hard time with my grades!

In all, there are almost 200 PDF files that each contain from 1 to 9 pages of documents. I did not scan everything because there were many documents with 10 or more pages but only one or two pages dealt with Grandpa. In these cases, I scanned the pertinent pages and left a note stating there were more un-scanned pages.

I cataloged each file with a short description and the date of the document along with other information that might be useful in a search. Once you enter the website page dealing with his records, you will see a table with this information displayed as column headers. Simply click on the file name of the record you wish to view, and the PDF will be downloaded to your device for viewing.

There is a lot of information in these documents that does not always apply to Grandpa, however, there may be information that would be useful to other families seeking information about their relatives. So feel free to download any document and send it to whomever is looking for the information.


As mentioned above, Riel.org only had back issues of the family newsletter dating back to 2009. The main reason was that these issues were produced electronically and could easily be loaded to the website. The creation of each month's edition specific web page was also not so hard as article headlines could be copied and pasted into the specific web page with very little effort.

Unfortunately, from 2008 and back, Grandpa used a CAD drafting program to type each article up in a "text box" that had no editing features whatsoever. He would then print each article and then cut and past them onto a master page layout. Once he had each page laid out, he would photocopy it once. Then he would run all pages through the photocopier once more to have a back and front master. Then one more time to make enough copies to mail out to everyone. While this worked well for him, it is not very conducive to providing electronic copies. Fortunately, and as I have mentioned before, he kept great files.

In fact, he kept just about everything he ever got that pertained to that month's edition. Each month's file looked something like this:

- Original master page layouts with the articles glued on.
- Photocopy of each master layout
- Two-sided photocopy of the master layouts
- Actual handwritten/typed stories by family members
- Pictures and postcards received.
- Programs for each of the grandkid's plays they were in (autographed by the grandkid)
- Tickets to movie theaters with the grandkids name that they took with them, written on it
- News articles that were sent in
- And anything else that came in that month.

As you can see from the issue shown on the right, there was only a single paragraph of text about a Benesch trip. However, in the files, there was a 3-page article that Carol wrote and it is now available along with other information for that month in the electronic version. Check it out!




So, as you can see there are a lot of documents besides the actual newsletter in each month's file. In fact, I would estimate about 15 - 20 different attachments were in each file along with the newsletter. Now I could have just scanned the newsletter, but I just felt there was too much history to not have it all available to everyone. So, here are just a few examples of the extras that were not in the newsletter:

- Some of the grandkids report cards from grade school (wont mention names here but Brett and Bryce might want to check them out).
- An essay from Michelle when she was very young describing what she hoped to have accomplished by the time she was 80. Interestingly enough, she has most of them checked off already, except the grandkids part, which I am sure will be coming along in another decade or two.
- Hand drawn pictures from just about every grandkid.
- · Poems and essays from the grandkids
- Handwritten letters and updates from all of us.

I would say that from 1991 to 2007 you will see a lot of extra material. But by 2008 it dwindles down and by 2009 there is just the newsletter. However, I did add as much to the file as I could or that was relevant. For example, I did not scan the playbill for every production one

of the grandkids was in. But if you see something and you think there could be more that you would like access to, just give me a call and if it is there, I will send it to you.

Just creating all of the pages for each of the added newsletter was a monumental task. Because, not only did I need to scan each edition and its accompanying documents into one file (a total of 204 files), but I also needed to create a jpeg file for each cover (another 204 files). Then create a unique web page for each newsletter (204 pages) with links to the supporting documents and listing the headlines from the newsletter. Finally, I had to type every headline in by hand (no more copy and past as these are scanned documents). Needless to say I have hundreds of hours invested in getting all of this information online.



There may be a few of you that will think why bother with all that work? My answer is that I believe the great grandkids will soon be old enough to see all of these issues and will really enjoy learning about their parents and how they grew up. After all, what great grandkid wouldn't want to be armed with their dad's report cards from when he was the same age as they are today? Or maybe some of the family members that are no longer with us will come alive in the pages of the newsletters and give the reader a good feeling as to who they were and what they stood for.

Regardless I think it is something that will be valuable to future generations to experience and read. There are letters from both Francie and Bruce that I have long forgotten. Many of them were abbreviated in the newsletter and to read them in the actual handwriting of the author gave me a better understanding and a feeling of real connection to the writer. What will you get out of it? Don't know, but I encourage you to do some exploring with your kids and grandkids. Especially when they come to you and ask... "Grandma, what was your mom like?" Here's a good place to start, Riel.org has a copy of an hour long recording of Grandma being interviewed by me, taking her from childhood until she married Grandpa. What better way to introduce someone to Grandma than to hear it directly from her?

Genealogy

Under the Family history section, you will find a location to view all of Grandpa's Genealogy files. Again, all cataloged and by clicking on the file name it will allow you to download the PDF file. There is not a lot of stuff but if Genealogy is your thing, it's a great place to start.



So What's Next?

Well, in the near future I would like to scan and catalog all of Grandma's letters to Grandpa (like I said Grandpa kept everything, unfortunately the same cannot be said about Grandma).

There are Grandpa and Grandma's medical records that could be useful to future generations. Again, when I have time they will be added. There are additional files dad kept, including his school years, personal interests, important papers, and other miscellaneous items that will be added over the next few years (as I find time).

Finally, and at some point, in the near future, I hope to add all of the family pictures both Grandpa and myself have taken over the years. The goal would be to have the photos searchable by name, date, or other keywords as seems appropriate. I have close to 50,000 family pictures and except for all of the great grandkids they are all tagged with the names of the individuals that are in the photo. OK, confession time, the great grandkids are not tagged yet because I am not sure who is who and will need some help on that front.



So, there you have it. I hope you explore Riel.org (Bob Gillingham's 50th birthday video is great, oh did I mentions Carol's birthday video isn't bad either). Hopefully, you will find something that makes you smile.









News from New Jersey!




Riley and Braeden Earn Awards!
