Kristy and Seamus had been encouraged for the last several years by their mother/mother-in-law to run their first-ever marathon, and they finally made the decision following Listy's 25th Rock 'N' Roll last year. Thus committed, they took on the challenge very seriously, running in several half-marathons, participating in daily gym workouts and, nearing race day, several 16+ mile runs, including a 22-miler. Both ran extremely well, finishing the distance in under 4 hours. Reflecting on the event, Kristy admitted that she couldn't imagine running a minute faster.

















Listy continues to be a running machine, and she attributes much of this to members of her Running Club who meet her at the ungodly hour of 5 a.m. most days to run in Mission Trails Park. For the race, Cory Hoffman, a dear friend, paced her for the first 6 miles, getting her off to a strong start. Doug Farkas, her running partner of 37 years, met her at mile 13 and kept her going strong (despite well-worn, sometimes inappropriate jokes). Sarah Risso, an international marathoner and great friend, ran the last 13, including the dreaded uphill, slanted 163. Along the way, husband Bob, brother Bob, Birdy, friend Joyce Poblete, Peter Risso and many others cheered her on as she ran to a 3rd-place in her (young) age-group, finish in her 26th-straight event, making her one of 37 full-marathon Legacy runners who have run continuously since 1998.



So, I exited the door. The pool was empty be-

cause it was for the spa, which was closed. The restaurant was not to the left as I had expected. What I saw was a driveway for emergency vehicles. I was clearly in the wrong place. There were 6 doors that would lead back into the hotel, but none of them had a key card access. I could get into the pool area but the exit out to the golf course and walkways were all locked. I went to the main gate expecting that I could push it open. Nope. I looked for a gate that I could flee from and there was none! I was caged in like a wild animal with not one escape route. I had to call my friend to come rescue me.

Now this really did not sit well with me. I thought about it for a couple of days and as I was preparing to leave, I decided that I wanted to talk to the manager about my experience. He listened very carefully but was not at all surprised or bothered by my experience. He told me that it has happened to other guests, and until they get enough complaints, there wasn't anything they can do. I told him that was unacceptable as the Omni is responsible for the safety of all their guests. I ranted about possible endangering situations like fires, bombs, gunmen, tornadoes, and rapists. I thought it was irresponsible to have an area where a person could be locked in and unable to find help.

So, I stewed on this for a day and then started writing a letter to Tiffany, the Loyalty Ambassador who had welcomed us to the Omni. I recounted my experience and asked to be connected to the head of security for the hotel and the general manager. She responded immediately to my request. I got letters from the general manager and from the man in charge of security promising me that their engineering team is working on creating safe exits for that space. They were all very apologetic about my experience and promised to do better for their guests. I felt good about pushing them on this topic and I have hopes that no one will be trapped in Texas, as I was.
