We help other camps create consent policies and problem resolution processes, so they have all the tools they need in case anything comes up. They can then call themselves a "Safe Camp". We were able to reach out to more camps than ever before with our online classes.



As we made our way into the event, we were surprised by the easiest entry we have ever had! Usually, we wait 3-4 hours in a line of cars to get in, but this year it took us 30 minutes to reach our camp, that is unheard of! The weather was beautiful! It wasn't too hot, no rain, and minimal dust. Perfect conditions for setting up and getting started. These conditions carried on the whole week and made the whole event really enjoyable.

Drew and I spent a lot of our time working in camp, helping our volunteers, hosting workshops, and also having great conversations with people from other camps. Many people came to visit us to learn more about consent and going through the process of becoming a "Safe Camp". We also had people stop by to ask for personal advice on how to communicate and use consent in their daily lives. It is always great to see people learning, growing, and working to better themselves. We also had a few visitors stop by to report concerns about activity in other camps and we were able to jump in and help resolve them quickly.











This year had the least number of reported issues, which is great to see! It shows that the community is taking what we teach seriously and actively working to make the event a safer place. Of course it wasn't all work, we did get to go out and enjoy the event from time to time. Some of our favorite moments were of course seeing The Man, riding around to camps and participating in their activities and seeing a plane fly overhead while firing fireworks and lasers from its wings and tail.

A really important part of the event for us this year was The Temple of Together. Every year a temple is built where people can go to leave memorials for lost loved ones, ask for forgiveness, or celebrate their own accomplishments. Earlier this year we said goodbye to our dog Kona and wanted to leave her a memorial in The Temple as one last send off. We left behind a picture of her with messages from both Drew and I written on the back, we tucked it away in a safe space that was easily seen and well lit. We spent some time remembering past memories and crying together but eventually got up to leave. As we did, we discussed that now we just needed to wait for a sign from Kona telling us she is ok and happy and that she is ok with us getting another dog to love just as much as we loved her. We rode our bikes away from The Temple to an art piece that was all metal, sculpted and bent to make large flowers. They were all lit up with lights and had smaller glass flowers attached to it, and inside each flower was a picture of someone. Hanging from one of these flowers was a small, quilted heart that said, "Give Me A Home". Drew and I instantly knew what it meant. On the last day of the event, we watched The Temple burn in silence as we said our final goodbye to Kona.







As the week came to a close, Drew and I packed everything up, and we started the long drive home. We were exhausted beyond belief, but we had a blast. This was one of the best Burning Mans we have been to. Next year, however, we won't be able to attend due to other things happening in our lives. So, this was a great year to end on as we take our break from next year's event.









