
















A NEW FAMILY MEMBER FOR BRIAN AND DREW








Our third day was a traveling day because we decided to make the drive to Memphis to see Graceland. That was also a fun surprise in many ways. Graceland (Elvis Presley's home) is interesting because the actual house reminds you of growing up in the 70's in terms of the styles displayed throughout the house. The kitchen had an avocado green sink which I'm sure my siblings will remember mom having when she redid their kitchen in Mission Hills.

The grounds were impressive with a very dated pool (very small); an indoor racquetball court; horse stables and a field for horses to graze through; and a burial place for Elvis and his family members. Across the street was where you got to see a ton of Elvis memorabilia which included many cars (lots of Cadillacs); motorcycles; fancy golf carts; clothing; awards; and many other items on display. They also had his private jets on display and shops of course if you wanted to add to your collection of Elvis wear.









We then drove downtown to the famous Beale Street which is known to be the home of the blues and where Elvis spent a lot of time. We ate lunch at B. B. Kings bar and got treated to a band playing the blues for us. We wanted to visit the Civil Rights Museum but ran out of time, so we jumped over to the famous Peabody Hotel to watch the duck's march.

The Peabody Hotel in Memphis is famous for its Marching Ducks, a unique tradition that has been a part of the hotel's charm since the 1930s. The tradition started in 1933 when the hotel's general manager, a man named Frank Schutt, and a friend went on a hunting trip. After the trip, they returned to the hotel and, as a prank, released live ducks into the hotel's ornate lobby fountain. The idea caught on, and the ducks became a beloved attraction. Now, every day at 11 a.m. and 5 p.m., a group of ducks marching from their rooftop home, through the elevator, down a red carpet, through the lobby, and into the fountain, where they swim and live until the next march.

The "Duckmaster" leads the march and told us that they change the ducks every three months, so they don't become too domesticated. The Peabody ducks have their own suite on the roof, complete with a special duck palace, and the Duckmaster is responsible for their care and daily procession.



Our last full day was used for checking out the mansions in the area where local stars live and then a stop at a distillery for a tour and a little whiskey tasting. The tour began with a story about the founding of Green Brier Distillery in the 1800s by Charles Nelson. However, due to Prohibition and other factors, the distillery shut down in the early 1900s, and the brand faded into obscurity.

Fast forward to the 2000s, when Charles Nelson's great-great-grandsons revived the distillery and began producing whiskey once again. The tour walks you through the story of their family's heritage and the rediscovery of the Green Brier brand. We then got to learn all about the whiskey-making process and ended with a tasting experience of four different shots of whiskey (I tried them but gave most of my shots to Bob to finish off). We had another day of walking around the town and ended our day at another brewery/distillery to have something to eat.









That night was a highlight as we had ordered tickets for the Grand Ole Opry where we saw the Gatlin Brothers (who

hosted the evening); with guest star Ruby Lee (From "The Voice" who was

a runner up) and Linda Davis. The headliner was Trace Adkins who did a great job ending our night with his deep-rich western voice.



Our last morning was also fun as we ventured to 12th South Street which is a gentrified neighborhood filled with cute shops and wonderful eateries. We had a great breakfast, did some power shopping, and then returned to the airport to fly back home.
